Full Report of Damage Caused by the

London Sept. 21 .- It may be interesting to compare the casualties in previous engagements with the dervishes with those at the battle of Omdurman. The losses of the enemy at the latter engagement will be seen to be far greater than those on any previous occasion.

Tel-el-Kebir, Sept. 13, 1882—About 2,-000 dervishes killed and wounded. One officer and 45 men of the British force killed, and about 300 wounded. El Obeid, October, 1883-Eleven thousand killed. Hicks Pasha's army, including several British officers and a London war correspondent, massacred. Only one man escaped. Dervish losses

to the proposed disarmament conference. JAMAICA'S CONDITION.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 21 .- At a public meeting, called for the purpose of discussing the possibilities of raising funds for the relief of the sufferers from the recent hurricane which swept over the West Indian Islands, the archbishop of the West Indies declared that the condition of Jamaica was such that it was not possible to do more than emphasize an expression of sympathy with those who were in need of help.

COREA DOMINATED BY RUSSIA. Yokohama, Sept. 21.—Advices from Seoul says the Corean Cabinet has decided to cancel the engagement of the nine American, nine British, five Germans, five Frenchmen and two Russians, who were enlisted in Shanghai to act as an imperial guard, Russia having protested that their engagement was a breach of the promise made when Russia withdrew the Russian adviser and instructors from Corea.

DRUNKENNESS

Interesting Figures Comparing the Population and the Number of Drunks.

Chief Williams Says Education and Competition Are the Two Factors Responsible for the Decrease of

Drunkards

Chief of Police Williams, when asked by an Advertiser reporter regarding the number of drunks now as compared with previous years, said the number of drunks before the courts had decreased fully 50 per cent during the last 20 years, and during the last ten years the number had decreased two-thirds. In 1887 there were 996 drunks before the court, out of a population of 26,315, or about 38 in every 1,000 of population. In 1897 there were 423 out of a population of 34,855, or about 12 in every 1,000. In 1898 the city's population was 36,224, and adding 2,000 for West London brings it up to 38,224. The number of drunks so far this year has decreased, compared with last year, and supposing them to be the same the percentage is somewhat less, .011.
