Losses in the Soudan

Casualties in Engagements With Dervishes.

The French Force Ordered to Leave Fashoda.

Queen Regent of Spain Favors a Reduction of Armaments.

Zurinden Reappointed Military Governor of Paris.

Full Report of Damage Caused by the Barbados Cyclone.

London, Sept. 21.—It may be interesting to compare the casualties in previous engagements with the dervishes with those at the battle of Omdurman. The losses of the enemy at the latter engagement will be seen to be far greater than those on any previous occasion.

Tel-el-Kebir, Sept. 13, 1882—About 2,000 dervishes killed and wounded. One officer and 45 men of the British force killed, and about 300 wounded.

At Omdurman, October 1884—Eleven thousand killed. Hicks Pasha's army, including several British officers and a London war correspondent, massacred. Only one man escaped. Dervish losses infinitesimal.

At Tel, January, 1884—Baker Pasha's army of over 2,000 men destroyed.

At Tel, Feb. 29, 1884—One thousand five hundred dervishes killed. Thirty-eight British officers and men killed, and 142 wounded.

Tamai, March 13, 1884—Two thousand dervishes killed.

At Kila, Jan. 17, 1885—Nearly 1,000 dervishes killed.

At Kila, June 7, 1886—Nine hundred dervishes killed, and 500 taken prisoners.

At Kila, April 8, 1888—Three thousand five hundred dervishes left dead upon the field. About 500 on the British side killed and wounded.

Omdurman, Sept. 3, 1898—About 13,000 dervishes killed and 16,000 wounded. Anglo-Egyptians killed, 50, wounded, 241.

FRENCH ORDERED TO LEAVE FASHODA.

Paris, Sept. 21.—The report is published here, but not officially confirmed, that Major Marchand has been ordered to retire from Fashoda, leaving that place in possession of the Anglo-Egyptian forces. Le Matin discredits the report, declaring that there is no reason why such a course should be taken.

On the other hand, a telegram received from a French source in Cairo says there is no information at present concerning Major Marchand's occupation of Fashoda. The French newspapers say the minister of foreign affairs has received no news confirming the report of the presence of Major Marchand in Fashoda. The rumors regarding the report, declaring that there is no reason why such a course should be taken.

SUPPORTS THE CZAR'S PROPOSAL. Yokohama, Sept. 21.—The Japanese Government has replied to the circular of Count Muraviev, the Russian foreign minister, suggesting international disarmament. The reply supports the czar's proposals.

GOT HIS OLD JOB. Paris, Sept. 21.—The cabinet council has reappointed Gen. Zurinden to the post of military governor of Paris, which he occupied previous to accepting the portfolio of the minister of war.

ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY DEAD. Barbados, B. W. I., Sept. 21.—Full reports of the damage wrought by the recent hurricane here show that there were 160 fatalities. Fifty thousand persons were made homeless. The full damage is estimated at more than \$1,000,000.

SPANISH ELECTIONS.

London, Sept. 21.—Special dispatches from Madrid say the provincial councils election has resulted in the return of the ministerial nominees, except at Bilbao, where the Basque patriot, Sarriena, has been elected by an overwhelming majority. Serious street disorders followed the election.

FORGERIES IN THE DREYFUS CASE. Paris, Sept. 21.—The papers here say the minister of war, Gen. Canoinho, has examined the documents in the Dreyfus case and has ordered the prosecution of former Col. Picquart, on the charge of forgery and using forged documents.

QUEEN REGENT FAVORS DISARM-AMENT. Madrid, Sept. 21.—The queen regent has replied to the circular of Count Muraviev, the Russian foreign minister, proposing the reduction of the excessive armament of the powers and the maintenance of real and lasting peace. Her Majesty praises the czar's project and promises to send a delegate to the proposed disarmament conference.

JAMAICA'S CONDITION. Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 21.—At a public meeting, called for the purpose of discussing the possibilities of raising money for the relief of the sufferers from the recent hurricane which swept over the West Indian Islands, the archbishop of the West Indies declared that the condition of Jamaica was such that it was not possible to do more than emphasize an expression of sympathy with those who were in need of help.

COREA DOMINATED BY RUSSIA. Yokohama, Sept. 21.—Advices from Seoul say the Korean Cabinet has decided to cancel the engagement of the nine American, nine British, five German, five Frenchmen and two Russians, who were enlisted in Shanghai, to act as an imperial guard, Russia having protested that their engagement was a breach of the promise made when Russia withdrew the Russian adviser and instructors from Corea.
