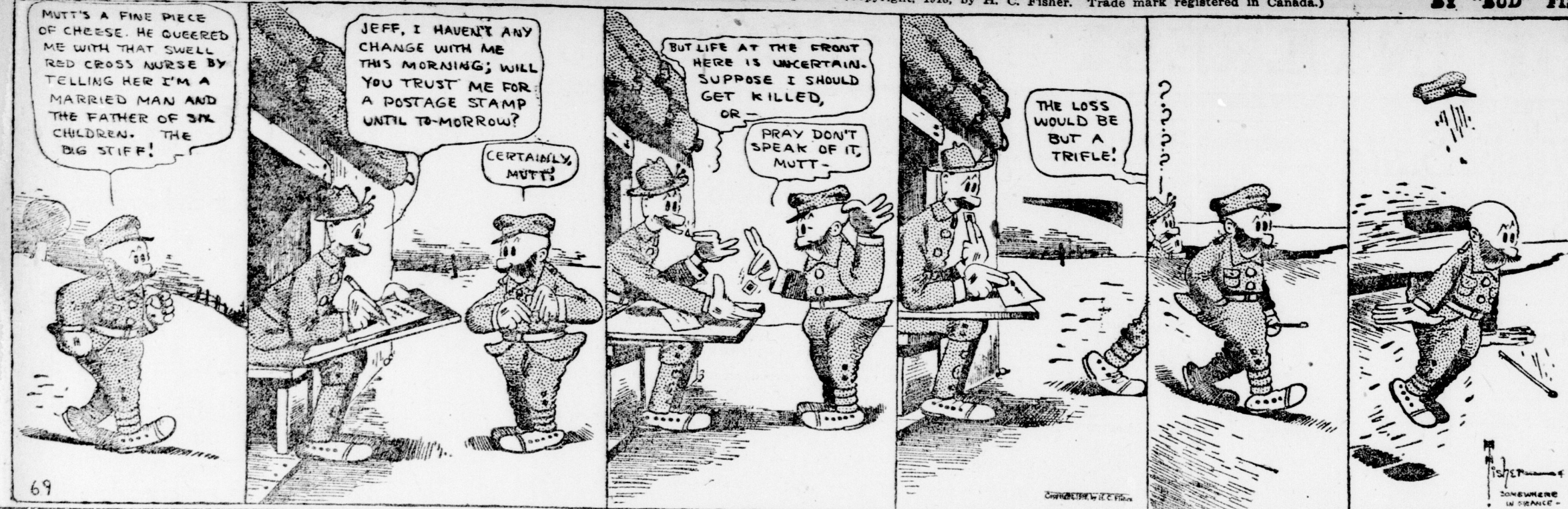

London Defaults Series To Sarnia Rugby Squad

Arthur Gillies Injured Leg in a Practice Game on Thursday, and Is Out of Game for Season—Sarnia Has a Good Chance for District Honors.

The London Collegiate Rugby team this morning defaulted the Junior O. F. C. series to Sarnia Collegiate squad.

Notified Sarnia. "Dunk" McLean, captain of the local team, notified Capt. Ferguson of the Sarnia High School team at 11 o'clock this morning that the London team would be unable to play at Sarnia this afternoon and that they were forced to default the series.

Arthur Gillies, right wing player for the locals, injured his leg in a practice game with the Western "U" team at Tecumseh Park on Thursday afternoon and will be out of the game for the season. He also notified the captain that he would be unable to go to the Tunnel City with the bunch.

By defaulting the series to Sarnia this will put the local team completely out of the Rugby circles this year, and it is very doubtful if the lads will even play an exhibition game now.

Capt. J. J. Syme received word from Sarnia this morning that the weather was not very favorable for a game, but if the London team arrived they would be willing to play.

Sarnia Has Chance. Sarnia will have a good chance now to play in the semi-finals and win the district honors, as they have an exceptionally strong team.

FREDDY WELSH IS NOW AN OFFICER

Will Be Unable To Attend United Sport Drive, But Is Doing His Bit Elsewhere.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Tribune says: "The committee that is going to conduct the monster boxing carnival at the Garden on Saturday night, November 16, received a telegram from Freddy Welsh, the former light-heavy champion of the world, yesterday, in which he said he would be unable to appear at the Garden, owing to 'official duties' that will keep him in Washington."

"Welsh, whose name out of the ring is Fred Hall Thomas, wired from Washington that he had just been promoted to a first lieutenant in the sanitary corps, and detailed to instruct wounded soldiers at Walter Reed Hospital in curative exercises. This removes a great attraction from the Garden, but adds a very fine officer to our army, so none should complain."

WOODSTOCK HOCKEY CLUB HOLDS MEETING

Billy Breen Will Handle the Lads in the Junior O. H. A.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 8.—Billy Breen, who will coach and train Woodstock's Junior O. H. A. team this season, arrived in the city today and met the executive tonight. He assumes his duties on December 1st, and everything in the way of preparatory training was left in his hands. At Mr. Breen's suggestion the local club will enter the competition put on by the Sportsmen's Patriotic Association of Toronto, open to Junior O. H. A. teams. The proceeds of these games go to help defray the expenses of the Christmas tree put on in Toronto for soldiers' dependents by the Sportsmen. CANADIAN HORSES AT NATIONAL HORSE SHOW

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Coming across the continent to compete for a blue ribbon at the National Horse Show for the benefit of the Red Cross, in Madison Square Garden, beginning November 11, the 4-year-old chestnut mare Sunshine Grace, owned by Miss Helen W. Farrell of Portland, Ore., has arrived in New York, and is now at Durland's Riding Academy. Miss Farrell, who is the daughter of John D. Farrell, one of the big railroad men of the Pacific Northwest, is stopping with relations at No. 1014 Madison avenue. Sunshine Grace holds the record for long distance entries in this year's horse show, although Netherhall's Pride, harness horse entered by Miss Isabelle Wamamaker of Philadelphia, was shipped all the way from Edmonton, Alta., which is almost half-way to Alaska, for the National Horse Show of 1918, where Miss Wamamaker purchased him to make a tandem leader. His former owner exhibited him as a hackney stallion.

FRANK TROCH LEADS THE TRAP SHOOTERS

Tillsonburg Man Up High in the List.

TORONTO, Nov. 8.—The latest batch of trapshooting averages, compiled by the Interstate Trapshooting Association, show Frank Troch of Vancouver, Wash., who starred at the national exhibition shoot here in September, leading the amateurs, and Homer Clark of Allen, Ill., topping the professionals. REGINA TO HAVE SIX-MAN HOCKEY

Manitoba Also Likely To Follow O. H. A. Lead in Amateur Game.

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 8.—It looks like six-man hockey for the Saskatchewan Amateur Hockey Association this season. When the annual meeting of the body is held in Moose Jaw on Friday, November 15, this change will be recommended. This is a radical departure, but should work out well in this province, for the size of the average rink favors hockey of the abbreviated brand more than they do the seven-man game.

This change was recommended by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association last spring, and Saskatchewan is falling into line with a recommendation to the moguls of this association.

Reports in Winnipeg papers would have it that the Manitoba Association is opposed to the six-man game, but nothing official on this line has been said by the Manitoba men. If all the other affiliated associations decided to play six-man hockey (which is a sure thing), then it seems a certainty that Manitoba, too, will follow suit.

ST. LOUIS CARDINALS SEEK SAILOR PLAYERS

Faircloth and Other Stars of Great Lakes Wanted by the Cards.

GREAT LAKES, Ill., Nov. 8.—According to "Rags" Faircloth, Western Association pitcher with the Great Lakes club during the last season, he has been offered a job with the St. Louis Cardinals next year if war conditions permit of resuming baseball.

Faircloth, a big right-hander, held a conference with Manager Jack Hendricks in Chicago recently, at which Hendricks, he said, offered him a contract. It has previously been reported in baseball circles around the station that "Rags" was in line for a job with Connie Mack.

With McAllister, a year ago Faircloth won 38 games and lost eight. His best box score in a job uniform was against the Norfolk club, piloted by Bill Jacobson, in the navy championship series. He blanked the seaboard club with two hits. He also hurled several one-hit games for Great Lakes, one against the strong Rock Island Arsenal team at Rock Island, and another against the Racine, Wis., team with Dick Crotcher, ex-Babe, flinging opposite him.

When the station team closed several weeks ago, Faircloth was assigned for sea duty aboard a mine-sweeper in the Atlantic fleet. He carries a yeoman rating, third class. "Rags" is a splitter, fields like a shortstop and hits well over 200 in the sailor circuit. Another sailor reaching an agreement with a big league club is Joe Doyle, known as the "Babe Ruth of Great Lakes," who has promised to play with the same club. Doyle actually has actually signed up. He affixed his moniker to a contract while in St. Louis on a furlough.

Doyle is a third baseman, a big, rollicking amateur who hits 'em a mile. In one regimental game during the last season he flogged a ball clear over the Camp Dwyer drill hall, a drive that corresponds to a blow over the Cub's left field wall.

A special type of contract was made for Joe by the National Commission. It specifies his baseball services are at the disposal of the St. Louis club after he is mustered out of naval service.

VETERAN BALL PLAYER DIES AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—"Silent Mike" Tiernan, famous batter and outfielder of the New York Nationals in the early '90s, died of tuberculosis in a hospital here today, under an assumed name. Not until his widow claimed his body did his identity become known.

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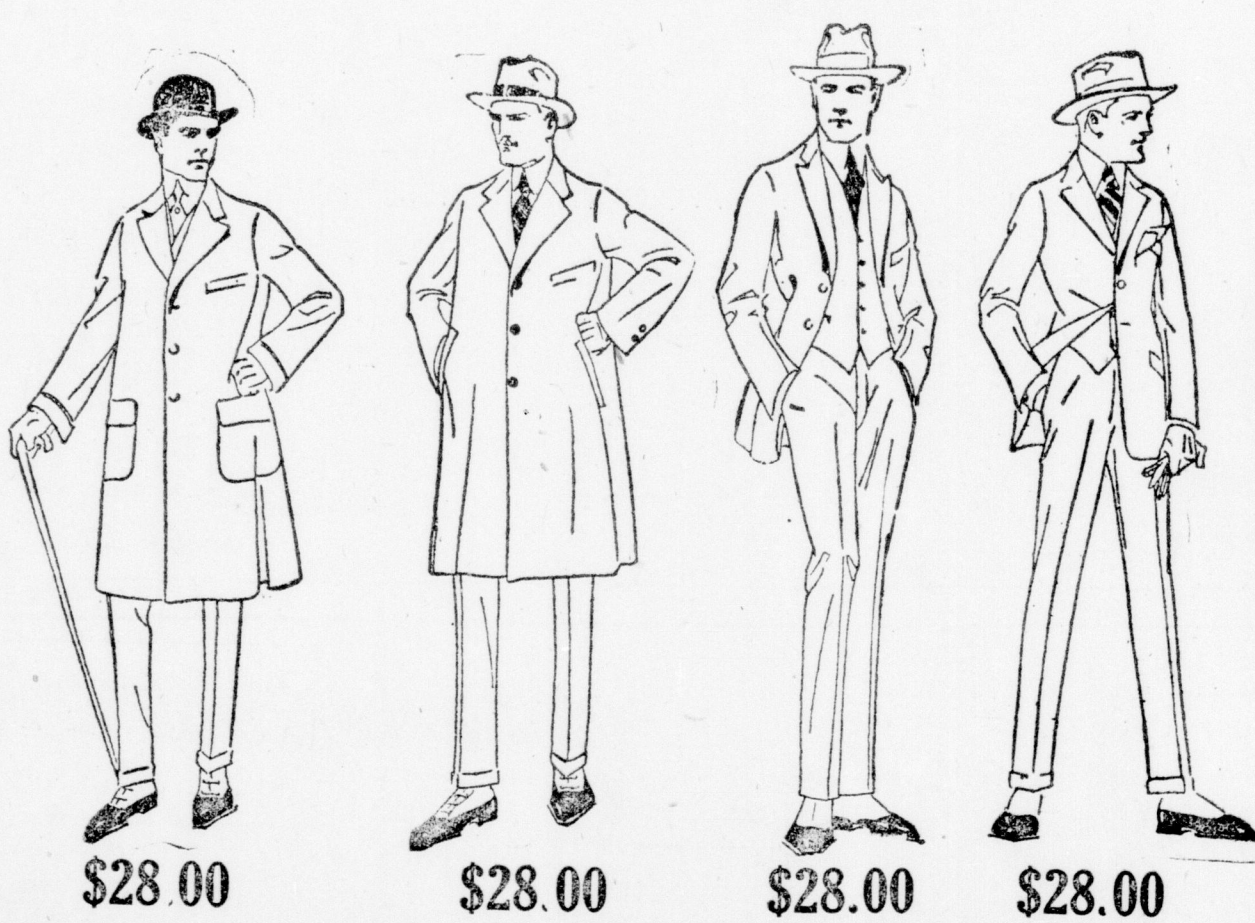
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
