FACES ENRAGED
VETS IN PARK

To Defend Editorial Stand
on Question of War
Gratuity.

BURDEN TOO GREAT

Says the Country Could Not
Stand Such an Ex-
penditure.

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—Twelve thousand returned soldiers, according to a conservative estimate, turned out this evening to attend the meeting in Queen's Park to form a gratuity league. There was a further attraction in the announcement that T. Stewart Lyon, editor of the Globe, would address the meeting. Mr. Lyon promised to do so after an interview with a delegation which approached him during the afternoon to discuss with him the stand of the Globe on the gratuity question.

"If Mr. Lyon can give us reasons why we should not receive this \$2,000, or if he can prove that most of the returned men do not want \$2,000, I am, and I think you are, willing to withdraw the demand," said J. Harry Flynn, who had made the attack on Sunday on the Globe policy, and who presided at the meeting.

"Since I had with my chairman this afternoon I have seen in tonight's Telegram the report of a speech he made from the steps of the city hall in which he said he would ask the editor of the Globe to speak to you, and if the editor would not do that, then he (Mr. Flynn) would say 'Mr. Lyon out,'" said Mr. Lyon in opening.

Unwarranted.

"I have been a soldier for more than 20 years. Many years ago I spoke to your fathers of social reform. I have been a soldier for more than 20 years. I do not think that Mr. Flynn had any warrant for suggesting that at any time the editor of the Globe should be asked to address his fellow citizens.

"There is another reason why I should not have to be dragged out. In the autumn of 1917 I went to France as the war correspondent of the Canadian Daily Press, where I was present during eight months. I was there at nearly all the big battles of that time— Vimy, Arras, the Somme, etc. Why should a man who risked his life like you, even if not in such a good cause, although I was getting the news for the people of Canada, be dragged out to address his fellow citizens? I resent the idea that it is necessary to drag me out to discuss any public question before these people. Besides, I am a Canadian citizen, and I am a member of the people of Canada. There may be a few Bolsheviks, but there is no more loyalty in the Empire than the city of Toronto, and I am sure that the men who risked their lives in France are not cowards.

Get To the Point.

"Get to the point," shouted a man in the audience.

"The point is this," continued Mr. Lyon, "that in the Globe of Saturday and again today I stated that there were many of the returned men who were not in favor of this \$2,000 gratuity which you men were asking for."

Hisses from different parts of the gathering brought from the chairman: "Order, men, you protest too much."

"If you will look at the Telegram of July 2 of this present year and read the proceedings of the Vancouver convention of the Great War Veterans," continued Mr. Lyon, "you will find that from the beginning of the convention there were many delegates opposed to the \$2,000 gratuity resolution."

The speaker then read the following extract from that report: "There were scores of the delegates who energetically, not to say bitterly, resented the suggestion of a gratuity of \$2,000. However it might be disguised, and there were men from all the provinces who held these views, and were determined to assert them."

Was Not Adopted.

"We are discussing the issue. At that time the Vancouver convention was held which was to give all men who enlisted \$1,000, and all men who went overseas \$1,500, and all men who were killed \$2,000. I want to say, too, and you can blame your leaders or anyone else you like, but that resolution was not adopted at the Vancouver convention. Why? Because a substitute was adopted which I will read to you: 'Resolved, that we urge upon the Government of Canada the necessity of the immediate adoption of a system of bonus payments the most satisfactory and effective means of re-establishing soldiers; further resolved, that after thorough thought and full consideration, we are of the opinion that the granting of such bonuses upon an equitable basis be limited to the most deserving, and that the Government be authorized to pay, so as to enable the beneficiaries to become efficiently re-established with security and happiness. The classification of beneficiaries, the method of distribution and administration to be decided by the Government and a parliamentary and G. W. V. A. convention.'

"The present situation is apparently caused by the fact that the Government has refused to appoint a commission. I have no quarrel with you on that point. If you feel that Sir Robert Borden is not properly representing the people of Canada in refusing to consider that matter, make your influence felt. I am not supporting him on this issue or on any other."

"Nor the returned men," interjected a voice.

"I say the financial resources are not sufficient,"—but the speaker was interrupted by hisses.

"All this time," he shouted after him, "listen to him now," shouted a member of the committee.

"I want to say a few words to place before you what will be the actual facts if you get this \$2,000 gratuity," continued Mr. Lyon after order had been restored. "The total enlistments of men for voluntary service since the war began amounted to 468,884. There were also enlisted under the M.S.A. 130,000 men; thus, altogether, 598,884 men were in the service. Of the men who actually got overseas and who would be entitled to this proposed gratuity of \$2,000, there were 418,952. In the R.A.F. and other imperial services there were 21,169 Canadians; and British recruits there were 14,590 to whom Canada has certain obligations. Deduct the killed and those who died of wounds and of disease, numbering 52,178, and whose dependents have to be cared for in the most liberal way, and it leaves 401,633, so it would require over \$802,000,000 to pay the \$2,000."

Huge War Cost.

"The total cost of the war to Canada up to November, 1918, when armistice was signed, including the expenditure in Canada and in Great Britain and France, was \$1,046,000,000. Up to the present time that has been increased something like \$300,000,000, largely because of the gratuities paid month by month. The amount of money required from the national treasury to pay these gratuities is almost four-fifths of the total war debt up to November, 1918. The total debt of Canada at the present time is \$1,650,000,000. When the war began it was \$350,000,000. If you voted \$2,000 a man, it would be \$802,000,000. 'What about Flavelle?' shouted a voice.

"I am not defending Sir Joseph Flavelle," retorted Mr. Lyon.

Crushing Load.

"It was estimated that the expense of demobilization and the capital charge of demobilization and the capital charge up to the end of the present year would bring the net debt close to two billion dollars," continued Mr. Lyon. "If you were to add the \$802,000,000 needed to pay this additional gratuity the debt of Canada would be
