**Cannot Censor  
Movies To Suit  
8-Year Olds**Provincial Treasurer Smith  
Expresses Opinion To  
Deputation.TORONTO, Nov. 17.—"You cannot censor moving picture pictures to suit 8-year-old children," remarked Hon. Peter Smith, provincial treasurer, to a deputation which represented various social service organizations of this city, in protest today against the showing of what the deputation regarded as objectionable pictures. Two pictures especially were objected to as dealing with matter of sex in a harmful way, and when it was made in the interests of young people against these the provincial treasurer gave expression to the words quoted.  
With regard to one of the pictures, recently banned by Premier Drury and then permitted on the screens by Hon. Mr. Smith, who has charge of the moving picture censorship, the minister produced a sheaf of commendations from medical, religious and other bodies on his action.  
Chairman G. E. Armstrong of the board of censors said that children too young to witness the pictures passed by the board, were too young to be at the theatres.

AND POLITICS,  
LABOR'S VIEWS**Montreal Trades Union Of-  
ficials Want Industries To  
Continue.**FOR ADVISORY BOARD**Also Suggest Permanent Tariff  
Board To Avoid "Tariff  
Elections."

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—(By Canadian Press.)—Organized labor's views regarding the tariff were given today before the tariff commission, both by representatives of the international unions and by Canadian unions.

President J. F. Foster of the Montreal Trades and Labor Council presented a factum which he claimed represented the views of ninety per cent of the labor men of Canada, which pronounced strongly in favor of a moderate tariff or protection sufficient to insure the continuance of industries which were the source of employment to Canadian labor.

The factum further strongly advocated the appointment of a scientific advisory board to consider all matters relating to the tariff and a permanent tariff board. By such means he considered the Dominion could get relief from "the curse of tariff elections from which it was suffering at present."

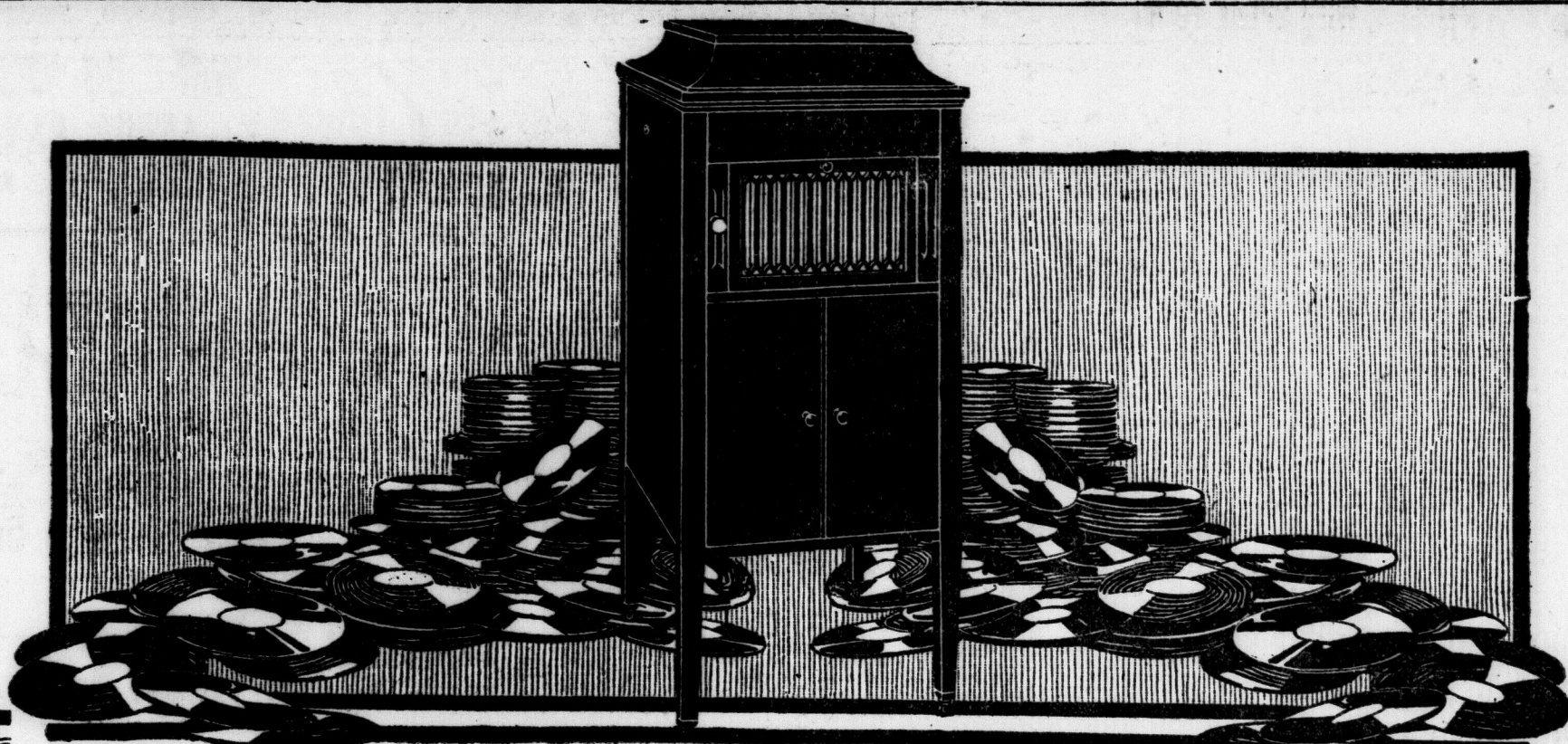
He admitted that the tariff could not be altogether taken out of politics, but hoped that the appointment of a tariff board and a scientific advisory commission much of the present evil conditions would be avoided.

Reasonable Protection.  
The same ideas were to a large extent voiced by David Giroux, representing the Canadian National Union, who came forward as an out and out supporter of reasonable protection in the interests of labor, in particular and the country in general.These were the main features of today's session of the tariff commission here, although a number of other important discussions and factums were contained bearing on the iron and steel industries, the flour milling trade, and other industries.  
The general complaint by businessmen was against the continuous dumping into Canada of surplus American goods in times of business stress, despite the anti-dumping laws.STEEL AND IRON VIEWS.  
MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—Another appeal by the various steel and iron interests for adequate protection of their industry occupied this morning's session of the tariff commission. W. W. Butler of Canada Car and Foundry Company, Limited, read a brief which had been prepared by members of a group of steel industries. T. P. Howard, president of the Phoenix Iron Works, afterwards laid before the commission the special claims of the structural steel industry.

FOR CHAIRMAN  
OF WAGE BOARD**Rollo Also Announces Names  
of Other Four Members.**TO ACT WHEN ASKED**Has Power To Regulate Wages  
of Women and Girls  
Underpaid.TORONTO, Nov. 17.—Professor J. W. MacMillan of Victoria University, Toronto, chairman of the minimum wage board, whose personnel was announced today by Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, the other members of the board are: R. A. Stapells of the Macfloy Manufacturing Company, this city; Mrs. H. W. Parsons, secretary of the National Council of Women, Toronto; H. J. Foster, secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, Hamilton; and Miss Margaret Stevens of the Toronto Garment Workers' Union.  
The minimum wage board, which was brought into being by legislation passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, has power to regulate, in certain cases, the minimum wages of women and girls. The board will act when asked to do so by some group of women workers considering themselves underpaid. The members of the board are to serve without remuneration, but the lieutenant-governor-in-council may fix a per diem allowance to be paid to the members upon their attendance at meetings of the board for the transaction of business, and the members shall be entitled to reasonable expenses while attending to the business of the board.

**OFFICERS CLAIM  
THEY WERE ABUSED**Other Side of Border Story  
Sent To Attorney-  
General.TORONTO, Nov. 17.—Following a sworn statement handed to Attorney-General W. E. Roney here today by Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, special inspector for the Windsor district, the attorney-general wired to A. F. Healey of Windsor, advising W. L. Messenger and C. C. Chauvin of Windsor to take their complaint against Rev. Arthur Spracklin and other officers and their car searched for liquor, while handcuffs were put on the wrists of the men.  
Hon. Mr. Roney has not made public the official statement of Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin on the alleged assault, but it is said that it is at variance with the story told by Messrs. Messenger and Chauvin. The officers, it is said, contend that while they were watching for a notorious bootlegger with a load of liquor in his car, Messenger and Chauvin came along, and, unnecessarily held up in their automobile last Saturday night by Rev. Arthur Spracklin and other officers and their car searched for liquor, while handcuffs were put on the wrists of the men.**EVERLASTING ROADS**TORONTO, Nov. 17.—Urging the Toronto Board of Trade to adopt the slogan "Good Roads Not an Expenditure, But an Investment," Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works for Ontario, this afternoon gave the members of the board a review of the work of the provincial highways so far completed and outlined the Government's big program for work yet to be done.  
"We want to build roads in Ontario," said Hon. Mr. Biggs, "not for 1920 or 1921, but roads that will be in existence as long as Ontario is a province."  
The aim of the Drury Government was to bring the rural and urban sections of the province into closer touch and harmony with each other, Mr. Biggs said, and a system of good roads, linking town and country, would go far toward accomplishing this. Mr. Biggs said he believed that if money were spent freely in the development of a system of good roads American tourist traffic would be attracted to Ontario, and the money would be paid back in five years.

Spracklin's hat was knocked off. Then he decided to use the handcuffs and take them into custody. This was done, the officers claim, without unnecessary violence.

**MERCHANTS ASK  
FOR PROTECTION**Declare \$300,000 Worth of  
Goods Stolen in Three  
Months.WINDSOR, Nov. 17.—Complaining that within the past three months merchandise valued in excess of \$300,000 has been stolen from stores by burglars, representatives of the Border Cities Retail Merchants' Association today waited upon Mayor Winter and vigorously urged a shake-up in the police department to insure better protection in the downtown district. Mayor Winter and Inspector Mortimer Wigia of the police department promised more patrolmen for the district which is now covered by four patrolmen and a sergeant. The mayor said he believed the police are doing their best, and that at present because of the large number of undesirable in the vicinity because of bootlegging more patrolmen should be added.  
The merchants signified their willingness to place lights at their own expense in downtown alleys to facilitate the work of the police and insure their safety.  
Mayor Winter told the merchants that plans for a double alarm system for both the fire and police departments to include a signal for patrolmen on beats will be included in the estimates for next year.**FEAR STEAM BARGE  
LOST ON LAKE ONTARIO**[Special to The Advertiser.]

John Randall, arrived in Kingston last night. Capt. Harry Randall is a son of Capt. John Randall of the steam barge Buena Vista. The Randall for many years has been in service on the Rideau Canal. She carried a crew of five, and they were residents of Seely's Bay and vicinity.
