M.C.M.'S. DRAFT AUTHORIZE PUBLIC DRAFTS OF \$100

Premier Says It's Impossible to Get Vouchers for Every Little Item—Audit Act Amended.

The budget debate resumed on the legislature settled down to routine business yesterday.

The house passed a resolution increasing the salary of the provincial auditor to \$500.

Col. Matheson explained to the house that the proposed amendments to the Audit Act, contained in bill 125, were not designed to limit the powers of the auditor, but to make the present act more workable.

Another amendment provided that sundry accounts to \$100, when certified to by a minister, should be passed by the auditor.

In committee the whole, some discussion took place in regard to this amendment. Hon. Col. Matheson complained that it was altogether impossible, in many cases, to secure vouchers for small items of expenditure, and it was often advisable, in the case of detectives, that this rule not be done.

The premier stated that the government could hardly ask officials to get vouchers for every imaginable item. The bill was the outcome of observations regarding the utter impossibility of working the present act. In reply to a remark by Allan Studholme, he said that there was very little suspicion on the part of the public with regard to public expenditures.

Hon. Mr. Duff's bill to amend the Stationary Engineers' Act was given a second reading. This bill provides that certificates shall be granted to stationary engineers who have resided in three years in the province, and subjects. Difficulty had been found at such points as Windsor, where American firms, who have large contracts in Canada, would bring over engineers, who could get a license under the present act. This bill would be a protection to Canadians.

Hon. Mr. Duff's other bill to confirm the transfer of the Ontario Veterinary College to the government was also given a second reading.

Mr. Downey moved the second reading of bill 145 to enable municipalities to purchase and distribute electrical power under the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

As bill to enable municipal councils to undertake certain public works by the issuance of debentures will apply to sewage disposal works, which might be ordered by the provincial board of health, and would have to be approved by that body, the work to be done to the satisfaction of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

The attorney-general made an exception in the case of Kingston, where the police magistrates are allowed to continue legal practice while holding that office.
