ON SLOW DOUBLED WITH BASES FULL

And Anderson Hit Over Wall
With Blackburne on, in
Same Round.

Baltimore, Md., April 25.—The American Orioles ran off the slugging leads this afternoon, and when the smoke cleared away the home team was humiliated to the tune of 13 to 4, before a crowd close on ten thousand. For seven innings it was a real battle, but in the eighth the Canuck heavy artillery got into action and it was all over but the shouting. It was a smashing, crashing round, that eighth stanza, with Anderson's roaring drive over the right field fence as the feature.

Johnny O'Brien, who had shut out the Buffalo crowd on the opening day of the season, with an hour to go, looked like the proverbial million dollars. A wild home on his part was the turning point and he took a terrific beating during the two closing sessions. Quinn, because of his brilliant play, was called Duff's regular, as five of the seven Orioles regulars are left-handed and they must be expected to be fed with south paw pitching aptly all season.
