Mr. Gilson Given Fine Hearing By East Middlesex Electors

East Middlesex Candidates Address Large Body of Electors at Pottersburg.

At a well-attended meeting of the electors of London Township held in Pottersburg yesterday afternoon, after the nominations, Mr. John Gilson, the Liberal candidate, was given a splendid hearing, and dealt with many of the important political questions. In his opening remarks Mr. Gilson spoke of the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway, showing that the mortgage placed on it by the Government covered everything, and contradicting a statement that had been made by Mr. Neely that it did not. Mr. Gilson explained that if it was a bad transaction it was not more until the Conservative Government had been in power for sixteen months, and had had every chance to investigate. Even then it was signed by Col. Matheson.

The La Rose Deal.

Mr. Gilson also explained the La Rose mining deal, stating that when the O'Brien people had come to Hon. A. G. MacKay he told them that the matter had been thoroughly investigated by a Government commission. He thought they knew what they were doing, and if the O'Brien people had any complaint to make he advised them to appeal to the courts and threaten the matter out there. They had not done this. In regard to statements that were being made that the Liberal Government had sold four acres of Cobalt Lake for \$3 an acre, Mr. Gilson said that lands which were known to be sold right along, even now at that price, which was a standard one. At the time of the sale no one in the world knew that there was anything about the lands under the lake to make them more valuable. Mr. Gilson defied anyone to show where one foot of land had been sold without public competition having been invited. The railroads had made these lands more valuable. The Conservative party were taking a great deal of credit to themselves for getting \$160,000 for the lands by their own economical methods. The truth was that they had nothing to do with it, and had not the silver been discovered there they would probably have never got a cent.

School Books.

Mr. Whitney was making a big talk about breaking up a school book ring. There was really no ring to break up. What he had done was to go to a publisher who had \$150,000 worth of school books on hand that would not comply with the specifications in some very minor details and by threatening to make his whole stock worthless had secured them at a greatly reduced cost, and was thus enabled to sell them very cheaply. LOOKS BRIGHT FOR MR. SUTHERLAND

West Elgin Nomination Meeting Gives Fine Reception To Liberal Candidate.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Dutton, June 1.—The nomination meeting held here today was very largely attended. The names of Finlay G. Macdonald, for the Conservatives, and Fred W. Sutherland, for the Liberals, were the only names before the convention. Arch. A. McKillop, of West Lorne, was chosen to preside as chairman, and the candidates agreed to each speak for half an hour. Mr. Macdonald spoke first, and utilized the time at his disposal in a eulogistic review of the record of the Whitney administration record. While heard with respectful attention, the Conservative standard-bearer did not arouse any noticeable enthusiasm. Mr. Sutherland, on the contrary, was enthusiastically received, and throughout his speech was frequently interrupted by bursts of applause. His opponent had referred to the fact that the majority of the Liberal candidates in the field were lawyers, and in the speaker's opinion it would take nearly all the lawyers in the country to keep track of the Conservative administration under Mr. Whitney. The Liberal party, he said, was the best friend the working people in Canada ever had. It had secured to them all the privileges which they now enjoy.

Scores Whitney.

Mr. Sutherland keenly scored the Whitney administration along the line of prison labor. If the Conservative administration had been conscientious in their promises, would they not have increased rather than lowered the contract price of prison labor, he asked. Under a Liberal administration there had been an actual profit of \$25,000 earned for the department by prison labor; under the Whitney Government there had been actual loss. Where was the money going, he asked. Was it fair to assume that it was being used for present campaign purposes? "I've seen enough of it through the 'The Star,'" said the speaker, "to believe it is." Mr. Sutherland then attacked the educational system of the Whitney Government, by which the model schools had been abolished, without which the poor man's son had no chance of being able to educate himself for the teaching profession. "If Whitney had another full term in power," said the speaker, "Toryism would never get back into power again in your lifetime nor in mine." Mr. Sutherland with his sarcasm then cleverly exposed the fallacy of the reduced school book fable, which the Whitney Government had foisted upon the people.

The Power Question.

Speaking at some length on the Niagara power question, Mr. Sutherland said he had it from good authority that Mr. Beck had said that he was sick of the whole thing, and that he felt like throwing the whole thing overboard. He was in favor of the Niagara power scheme, but it was being used by Mr. Beck as a political football. In conclusion Mr. Sutherland said it wouldn't hurt his feelings very much if he were not elected, but if he did win out on the 8th of June he assured his hearers that he would represent the best interests of the riding to the very best of his ability.

Mr. Sutherland, without doubt, made a splendid impression upon the large gathering, many of whom had never seen nor heard him before, and by this good impression increased his chances of election about 100 per cent.

AUTO SKIDDED, TWO DEAD

Fatal Accident to Pleasure Party on Way From Coney Island.

New York, June 1.—A touring automobile with a party returning from Coney Island early today was overturned while speeding up Ocean Parkway, and two of the men were killed. Two others were seriously injured, but not fatally. The dead are William G. Bonbrant, aged 42 years, and Thomas Nolan, aged 45, of Brooklyn. Those who were injured are Victor P. Brandies and James McKenna. Brandies had a fractured arm and McKenna a broken shoulder. Two other men who were in the car at the time of the accident escaped without injury. The automobile skidded while rounding a curve and overturned.

THE SITUATION AT SAMOS

Continued Absence of News Causes Anxiety at Constantinople.

Constantinople, June 1.—The continued absence of news from the consular agents at Vathy, the capital of the Island of Samos, where the people revolted about a week ago, because of alleged impositions by the Prince of Samos and the governor of the island, is regarded as significant, and gives rise to concern here. The British and French embassies have reminded the Porte that no modification is to take place with regard to the status quo at Samos, and that after order has been restored the Turkish troops are to leave the island.

The Turkish Government has sent satisfactory assurances on this point to the embassy.

Owing to the conflicting accounts as to the nature of the trouble the powers may send a commission to report on the situation at Vathy.

SENT TO PORT HURON.
Port Huron, Mich., June 2.—Sarah Norbom, from near Stratford, was apprehended by the Immigration officers Monday. She was picked up at midnight Sunday. The girl said she was told to come to Port Huron for employment by a man whose name she had forgotten. Being a Canadian, the authorities requested that she be deported to Canada.

POET FRECHETTE CALLED BY DEATH

Celebrated French-Canadian Author Passes Away at Montreal.

Montreal, June 1.—Dr. Louis Frechette, the Canadian poet-laureate, and veteran litterateur, died tonight at 10:20, after an illness of 24 hours. Dr. Frechette, who was in his 70th year, had been living with his wife in the deaf and dumb institute on St. Denis street for about a year. Though not in vigorous health, he was not considered to be suffering from any malady, except the burden of his age. He was suddenly seized with a stroke of apoplexy on Saturday night and never regained consciousness. Medical aid was at once summoned, as was his daughter, who is the wife of Mr. Honore Mercier, who is an alderman and member of the Legislature.

When the news became known it caused a great shock of surprise, as Dr. Frechette was one of the familiar figures of Montreal. His serious illness was unexpected, and his death will cause genuine regret in all parts of Canada.

Dr. Frechette had for years stood for the highest ideal of poetic expression among French-Canadian writers, and the crowning of his work by the French Academy some years ago gave him a European reputation. His leadership, despite the work of younger writers in his own tongue, he had steadily maintained.

G. T. R. NOT AFTER IT

Not Seeking Control of the Wabash-Pittsburg Terminal Railway.

Montreal, June 1.—Grand Trunk officials give an absolute denial to the report that the Canadian road intended to take over the Wabash and Pittsburg Terminal Railway, which recent-ly was into the hands of a receiver, the Grand Trunk. It was stated, in the plenty of new work on hand in the construction of the G. T. Pacific, and had no intention of going so far afield. Moreover the Wabash-Pittsburg is some 350 miles away from Buffalo, their nearest terminal, and has no outlet to the sea.
