Y'S MEN'S CLUB URGED TO HELP SAVE FORESTS

Interesting Address Given
In Moncton By Senator
C. W. Robinson

TRACES HISTORY OF
N. B. CROWN LANDS

Expresses Hope More Pulp
and Paper Mills Will
Start In Province

MONCTON, April 24.—Senator C. W. Robinson was the speaker at the Y's Men's Club luncheon at the Y. M. C. A. today. He gave an interesting address on problems of our crown lands in connection with the "Save the Forest" campaign now being carried on. He said that although people living in the city might not be as interested in the forests as those living in the country, they should nevertheless do their part in seeing that the most valuable asset of the country was preserved. More than one-third of the Province of New Brunswick he said was taken up with crown lands. These lands were administered from England until 100 years ago when they were handed over to the government of the province. At that time the lands were selling for as low as one cent an acre and at the time they were taken over by the government there was a surplus of 1,500,000 pounds sterling. The receipts from the lands in the last few years have averaged \$1,000,000 a year, in spite of the fact that the timber was decreasing. A large percentage of this was from game and fishing leases. More than 1,000,000 acres of these lands had been given to settlers who have had to comply with

PASTOR TO PREACH FAREWELL SERMON

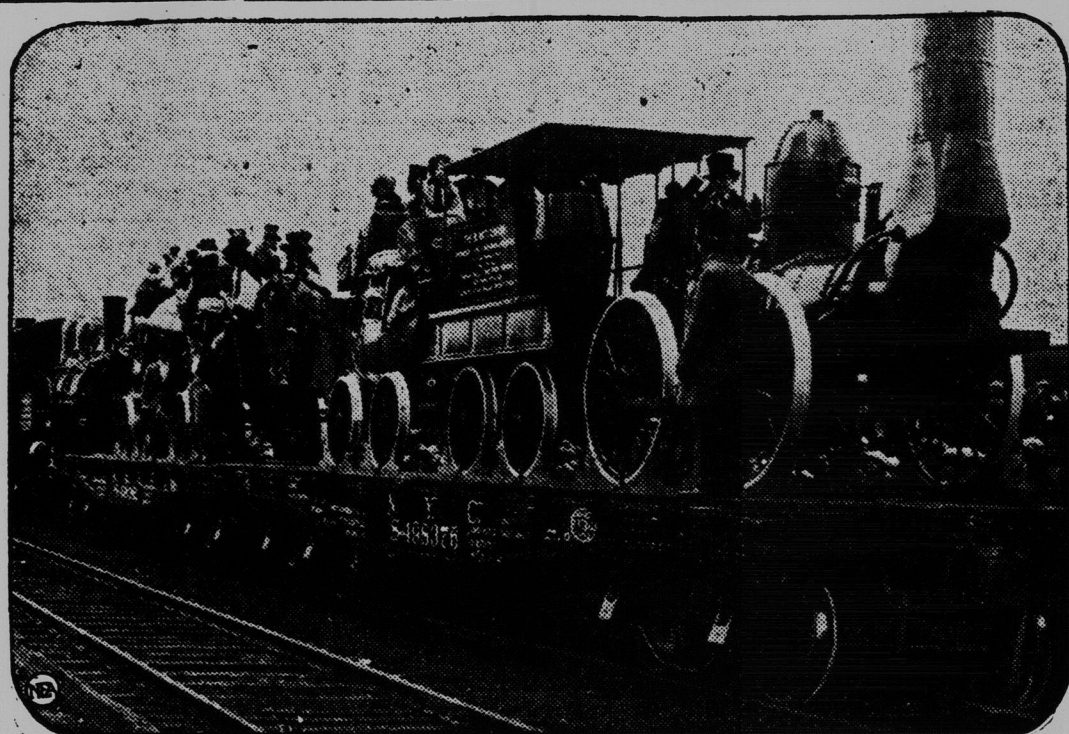
Rev. M. S. Richardson to Say

SLEEPY SICKNESS CAUSES CHILDREN TO BE HELD INSANE

Turns Little Victims Into
Thieves, Prevaricators
and Disturbers

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., April 23.—The startling assertion that many Birmingham parents have been reduced to such deep despair by the moral changes in their children caused by attacks of sleepy sickness that they have had them certified under the Lunacy Act is made by Dr. George A. Auden, the Birmingham schools medical officer, in a report to the Birmingham education committee. Dr. Auden states that statistics show that moral changes in the little sufferers from sleepy sickness are extremely frequent, particularly in the direction of thieving and lying. Apart from actual delinquency, however, there were changes in behavior such as spitefulness, disobedience, noisy restlessness, excitability at night accompanied by singing, whistling and talking, and the persistence of certain perverse habits, such as tearing their bed-clothes to pieces. These changes in habit make the children a positive curse to their harassed parents in the overworked homes from which they often come. "In not a few instances," states Dr. Auden, "the harmony of the home and the amicable relations with the neighbors have been completely destroyed by the presence of one of these children, and the position is often pitiable.
