Thus did Dr. W. A. Parks, professor of geology in the University of Toronto, sum up his convictions of the much discussed question of evolution, in his presidential address before the Royal Society of Canada here last hight.

"The evidence for evolution is circumstantian, but it is so overwhelming that scarcely a scientific man holds other opinion," he said.
