**WHY DOES A MAN MARRY HIS NURSE?**

(N. Y. Evening Telegram.)

During a dinner recently at which there were several doctors present, the discussion arose as to why trained nurses so often married well, and it was generally conceded to be due not alone to the greater susceptibility of the patient when ill and in constant propinquity to his nurse, but also to the fact that they recognized her capability, executive efficiency and immaculate-ness.

One physician goes so far as to say that men feel that nurses, knowing so much of the human body, and its lack of rectitude, are essentially fitted to become the mothers of their children; also, they are prone to weigh in the balance of her good points the training that has made her punctual, neat and well-versed in dietary lore.

There are many suggestions for the non-professional woman to profit from in the above, some of which she could so easily appropriate to herself without the arduous hours of real labor involved in the nurse's curriculum of duty. One of the many beneficial results accruing from the war will be the first aid and emergency work women have been learning aside from the less tangible though equally character moulding lessons in unselfish service.

In many of the recruiting circulars sent out to women in the United States just now "feministism" is mentioned as a thing to be guarded against. It seems to have a slightly different meaning as pertaining to war work from its former usual signification of the tender emotions. The age limit of 25 is considered safe in most instances. This age barrier is a decidedly wise provision on the whole, for sturdier virtues than "feministism" are required in the nurse's role of comfort.

**COALITION CABINET LIKELY FOR JAPAN**

London, Sept. 27.—Marquis Kinnouchi Saionji, former premier and president of the Constitutional party, has been commanded by Emperor Yoshihito to form a Japanese cabinet in succession to that headed by Field Marshal Count Terauchi, recently resigned, according to a Tokyo dispatch forwarded from Tientsin to the Exchange Telegraph Company. It is probable, the dispatch adds, Count Saionji will organize a coalition ministry.

**TIME CHANGES ON C. G. R. LINES**

Effective Sept. 29, Service to P. E. I. via Cape Tormentine.

Time changes effective on Sept. 29, on Canadian Government Railways lines, will slightly affect trains leaving St. John, N. B. 14 "express" which connects with No. 290 eastbound "Ocean Limited" for Halifax at Moncton, will leave at 2.10 p. m. instead of 12.50 noon, and will not run on Sundays. No. 10, the "night express," will depart at 11.35 p. m. The "Maritime express" will be the daily train between Halifax and Moncton after the change, and the "Ocean Limited" will run daily except Sunday out of Halifax.

Passengers for Prince Edward Island will make connection by taking No. 18 express leaving at 7.10 a. m. connecting at Sackville with train leaving for Cape Tormentine at 1 p. m. No. 18 will wait twenty-seven (27) minutes at Sackville for dinner, and the new restaurant in the station will cater to the needs of travelers desiring lunches or meals. Passengers for the Island will have ample time to enjoy a meal there.

There is practically no change in the time of trains arriving. No. 13 express, the connection with the westbound Ocean Limited, will arrive at 6.50 p. m. as usual, but not on Sundays. No. 337 and 338 suburban between St. John and Hampton will be discontinued. 10-3

**SAYS WAR CANNOT LAST MORE THAN ANOTHER YEAR**

Washington, Sept. 28.—The war cannot last more than a year, according to Senator James Hamilton Lewis of Illinois, who has returned to Washington after a trip abroad. Speaking informally with other senators, he said that Austria, "by driving on with her utmost and she will make peace on any terms rather than see the struggle go on until she is crushed out as a strong power. The only thing required of us is that we must keep driving on, sending men and guns and equipment, and giving the enemy no pause."
