## NORTH SHORE PROTEST AGAINST ABANDONING OF C. E. RAILWAY

Chatham Board of Trade Leading the Fight—Bathurst Curers Win From Chatham

Chatham, N. B., March 7.—Four ranks of Bathurst curers came down yesterday and played the locals, the result being a victory for the Bathurst curers, 61 to 40. Supper was served in the club rooms, after the match.

Snow began to fall last night at midnight and at seven o'clock this morning nine inches had fallen on the level, and the fall of snow showed no signs of cessation.

A large meeting of members of the board of trade was held last evening to discuss the matter of the proposed abandonment of the Canada Eastern Railway from Nelson to Blackville. Delegates were present from upriver points, bringing two largely signed petitions vigorously protesting against the change. Other meetings will be held and more petitions will be handed in. These with a memorial from the board itself will be laid before the local government and their assistance solicited and also will be brought to the attention of the minister of railways.

This part of the railway provided last year more than 370 cars of lumber. There are 1,400 people accommodated by it.

## PEOPLE WANT A CHANCE AT BORDEN

A Remarkable Political Demonstration at Shediac Last Night

Moncton, N. B., March 7.—A Liberal meeting in Shediac last night presented a surprise to the visiting Liberal speakers. They thought they were going to a little family gathering to open the first of a series of political educational meetings, but, to their surprise, Smith's Hall was crowded. A large contingent sat upon the platform, several scores were standing for want of seating room, and scores of people were turned away unable to obtain admission.

The audience was almost exclusively composed of men and voters. Some of them had driven fourteen miles to register by their presence their protest against the present government at Ottawa, and to endorse the attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the help given him by Hon. H. R. Emmerson.

The chair was taken by James McQueen, who dealt exhaustively with the naval question; Hon. F. J. Sweeney, who spoke on general issues; and P. J. Veniot, who addressed the meeting in French and English, discussing federal and provincial politics.

The meeting closed between 11 and 12 at night, with ringing cheers for the King, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. H. R. Emmerson and the speakers. The people clearly showed that they want a general election. They want a chance to get at the Borden government to undo the mistake of September, 1911, and place Canada once more in the forefront of the loyal and progressive portions of the empire, under the statesmanlike guidance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

It was one of the finest political meetings ever held in Shediac, and the significance of the meeting lies in its proportions and the splendid response of the people to hear their own county speakers. The interest of the people was shown in the fact that those standing had to remain so for over three hours.

**DR. FRIEDMANN'S CURE**

U. S. Government to Make Test —The Doctor is Vexed at Critics

New York, March 7.—Dr. Friedrich E. Friedmann, of Berlin, has consented to have the government make a test of his serum, which he declares will cure tuberculosis. Meanwhile, an active investigation of the culture prepared by the board of health department here is in progress, but it will be some days before the board is able to state conclusively whether the serum has any efficacy or not.

Dr. Friedmann, stung by attacks made upon his ability as an operating surgeon and physician, outside of any connection with his alleged cure, said just as evident as the fact that he had been branded as a "fake" by at least one of the doctors who witnessed his first administration of the serum at the People's Hospital, he would continue with his work.

Dr. Friedmann, in reply to the attacks that he had selected just the cases he chose and no others, said: "Tuberculosis is a long, lingering disease and it is just as evident that the process of healing has to be slow as the process of destruction is gradual. I have a cure for tuberculosis, not for death."

Up Go Sardines

Eastport, March 7.—Beginning this week, an increase in the price of sardines from ten to fifteen cents a case went into effect, and, as the supply held over in this city is about exhausted, it is expected that the price is likely to go still higher before the new pack is ready for the market, after April 15. This insures a busy summer in this city and Lunenburg if the spring run of fish holds out.

Egypt to Tripoli Railway

Cairo, March 7.—A syndicate has been formed for the purpose of building a railway between Egypt and Tripoli, at a cost of about \$40,000,000. The syndicate will, it is said, agree to complete the railway within four years.

Capital for the undertaking will be raised in Egypt and Italy.

## BONDS AND FIRE RECORDS FOR CANADA DURING JANUARY

Toronto, Ont., March 7.—The municipal bond sales in Canada for February as compiled by the Monetary Times amounted to \$1,088,906 compared with \$1,337,500 for January and \$2,596,378 for the corresponding period last year and making a total of \$2,376,300 for the year.

New Brunswick bonds brought \$23,000. The estimate of Canada's fire loss during February amounted to \$2,037,386 compared with \$1,660,155 for the corresponding period last year.

Swimming Records Broken

Chicago, March 7.—Three world's swimming records were shattered at the Central Amateur Athletic Association meet held last night. Harry J. Heber set a new mark of thirty seconds for the fifty-yard back stroke, and A. C. Rathel, twenty-four yards in nineteen seconds flat, while the Illinois Athletic Club relay team swam 100 yards for a new world's mark of 1:17. Heber and Rathel belong to the Illinois Athletic Club. Only local men competed.
