TARIFF NEGOTIATIONS OPENED IN WASHINGTON

Washington, Jan. 8.—A determined effort to lay the foundation for a reciprocity treaty between the United States and Canada was initiated Saturday, when Secretary of State Knox welcomed at the state department the representatives of the Canadian government. Mr. Knox explained to the Canadian envoys the powers conferred upon the representatives of the department of state and the purposes of the United States government in entering into the negotiations.

RECORD REVENUE FOR THE DOMINION

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—The financial statement of the dominion, published in the Canada Gazette today, is one of the most satisfactory for a very long time. The revenue for December was \$9,790,374.14, an increase of \$1,056,816.09, while the expenditure for the month was \$8,320,283.13, an increase of \$85,729.36.

EVERY DAY CLUB

Rev. Mr. Anderson Draws Notice to Serious Conditions Due to Cigarette Habit

At the Every Day Club last evening Rev. J. H. A. Anderson said he had read in the press that 75 per cent of the young men who applied for positions in the Canadian navy, for British Columbia and the West Indies, were rejected on the ground of being unfit because of the effects of the cigarette habit. "It is surely a very serious thing if the young men of our country are unfit themselves, physically for the strenuous work of life by the indulgence in bad habits." The same remark could be applied in regard to the drink habit, and Mr. Anderson drew attention to this phase of the question. With regard to law, he pointed out that there are laws regarding the sale of cigarettes, the liquor traffic, and the like, which are for the purpose of protecting a man from himself, and others. The law is kindly. Back of all efforts to enforce law is a kindly heart, even if the law is not always realized, or if an unkind judge or lawyer conveys a different impression. The heart of the law is kindly, and aims to lead him whom it touches to change his ways and become a kind and good citizen. But while the law may clean a man's surroundings and tell him what to do and what to avoid, it cannot do all that is needed. There must be that inner force to touch the will, be the conscience and soul of the man, and which is inspired by God Himself.

Mr. Anderson was heard with deep interest. Chas. A. Jones, vice-president of the club, occupied the chair. The orchestra played an excellent programme.
