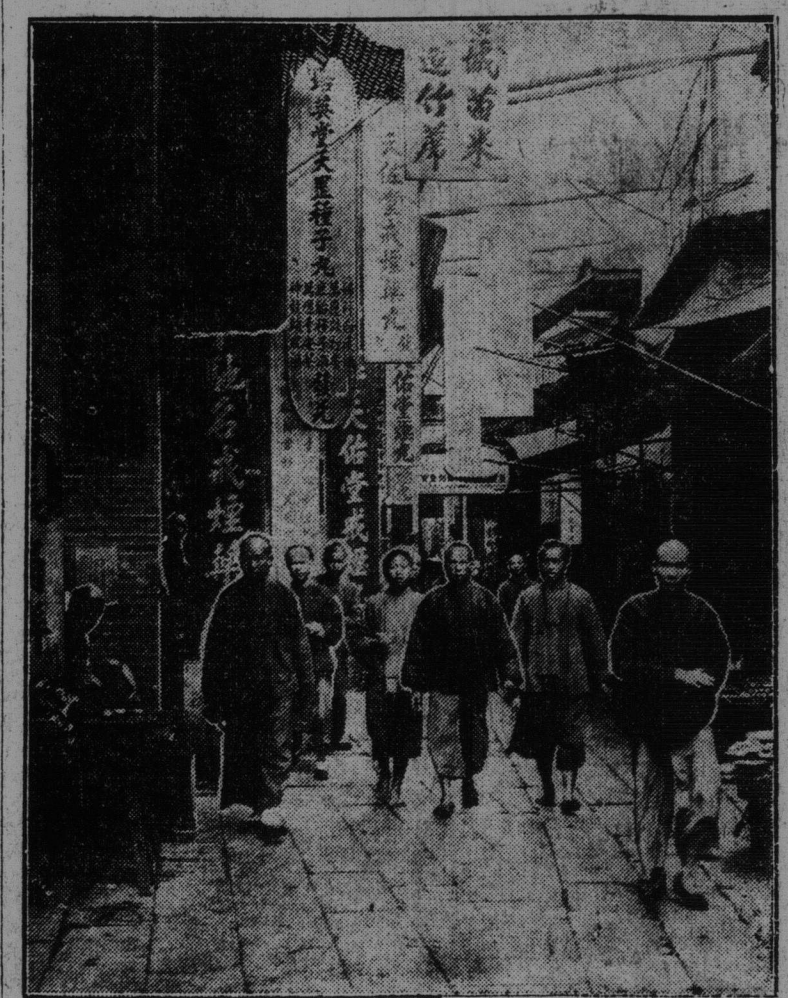

THE C. P. R. TO TEACH SCIENTIFIC FARMING ON SPECIAL TRAIN

Thirty Day Tour of West Demonstrating Value of Doing Things Properly in Getting Wealth From Soil

Montreal, May 15.—Co-operating with the Agricultural College of Manitoba, the Canadian Pacific Railway has decided to despatch through the western provinces this summer a special train which will be equipped to show the farmers living in the districts through which it passes the value of scientific farming.

In the past practically only the younger generations have been taught the principles of scientific farming, but now it is felt that in order that the full benefits of the system be received, it is necessary to teach the old-timers, as well as the younger farmers the way of getting the best from the soil.

With this end in view a C. P. R. special train will make a tour through the western provinces, a period of thirty days, and to every important point in Western Canada. The train will be known as the "Agricultural Special," and it will consist of a horse car for animals required by demonstrators, a brine tank, a lecture car, a cafe car and a sleeper for the staff and attendants.

The ladies of the farm are not to be neglected. One car will be devoted to kitchen gardening, horticulture and domestic science, and will be in charge of a lady expert. Another car will be devoted to dairying and hog raising, and the third to mixed farming and good roads. A schedule has been drawn up, and from some points not scheduled, the C. P. R. will issue return tickets at single fare on regular trains. Arrangements have been made for a staff of lecturers. The train will leave Winnipeg on May 30.

THE CHAMPION

TYPEWRITER OF WORLD HERE TODAY

Miss Rose L. Fritz, world's champion typewriter, arrived in the city on the Montreal Express this morning. She will remain in the city until Thursday and during that time will give demonstrations of her typewriting ability.

Miss Fritz completed the international typewriting contest two years ago, and won the trophy which is valued at \$1,000. Her record for one hour's continuous writing of new copy is 190 words a minute, made in Toronto a couple of years ago. Her best record for one minute's writing is 260 words. This was a repeated record which was made in London, England, in 1908. She has a record of 165 words a minute blindfolded. Since March 1908, when she completed in thirty contests thirteen of which were championships. Two years ago she visited London and had the pleasure of displaying her ability before the present king and queen. Miss Fritz uses the touch system; she hardly ever looks at the keys while writing. She uses all her fingers, and spaces with the thumb of the right hand. On Thursday she will leave for Halifax to give demonstrations there. While in the city she is at the Royal.
