WANDERED INTO THE POLICEMAN'S HOUSE AND WENT TO SLEEP

Coyle Found Reposing on The Kitchen Floor and Does Not Know How he Got There

Three prisoners on drunkenness charges faced Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning, and two of them were remanded. George Connors, one of the three, was fined \$4 and the other two, Frank Buchanan, and John Coyle, were sent into jail in order that their cases may be investigated. John Warrlow, charged with being a common vagrant, was also remanded to jail. He was arrested at the S. A. Barracks in Prince William street last night. He had been staying there for some time and had no money. He told the court that his home was at Grand Falls. An effort will be made to have him sent there.

Coyle, who is a middle aged man, was arrested early this morning in the kitchen of Policeman McLeod's house in Britain street. Mrs. McLeod was awakened by hearing somebody in the back part of the house and she awakened her husband who went out to investigate. He found Coyle calmly reposing on the kitchen floor. He could not tell how he got there or how long he was there. It is thought that he was roaming around the yard at the rear of the house and, finding the door open, walked in and went to sleep.

He told the court that he lived in Woodstock and had no home here. His face was badly cut and he said that someone had beaten him last night.

When arrested this morning he told Policeman McLeod that he was going to court this morning anyway to lay a charge of assault against a man and asked the policeman to be allowed to go. His plea did not work, however, and he was locked up.

In the police court this morning Maurice Gritz was fined \$8 or twenty days in jail for obstructing the traffic on Pond street with his horse and shaver. He denied the charge, but Policeman McNamee told a different story.
