POWER CO. BRINGS IN USEFUL MACHINE

Air Compressor Will Do
Notable Work in the
Streets.

An expert from the Ingersoll-Rand Company is expected in the city soon to instruct the company's men how in the efficient handling of this machine.

Plan is Apart From Gen-
eral Training Camp
at Sussex.

Details of the annual training for non-permanent units have not been completed yet. Lt. Col. H. C. Sparling, D. S. O., said this morning, but it has been decided that a camp school for unqualified officers and N. C. O.'s of cavalry and infantry will be held at Sussex from June 23 to July 5. Col. Sparling expects that this will result in the qualification of a majority of officers and N. C. O.'s in the district who do not possess certificates at present.

This school, Col. Sparling expects, will be entirely independent of the annual training camp but will be commanded and administered by the camp officers.

The syllabus to be carried out at this school will be similar to work done at royal schools of instruction. An interesting feature of the camp will be the presence of a demonstration platoon of the Royal Canadian Regiment. This platoon, which is very highly trained, is expected to be in camp from June 30 to July 5. The platoon will demonstrate all features of infantry work, Col. Sparling said.
