Halifax, N. S., May 10—Application for appeal in the case of Captain Andrew Gauvreau, of Yarmouth, N. S., former skipper of the British schooner Douglas B. Conrad, who was sentenced to three months imprisonment and a fine of \$500 or in default of payment to six months in jail, was dismissed in the supreme court here this morning.

Captain Gauvreau was convicted, in April last, on a charge of receiving stolen goods, knowing them to be stolen, and disposing of the goods, a cargo of liquor, for the sum of fifty thousands dollars off Boston harbor last August. The original charge was of piracy on the high seas. Captain Gauvreau being charged with having piratically boarded the schooner and seized the cargo after shooting and wounding the mate and cook of the Lucille B, a Weymouth N.

FAREWELL PRESENTATION.


