BIG LIQUOR SEIZURE MADE AT MUSQUASH

TWO ARRESTED AND FINED \$200; ONE ESCAPES

144 Cases, 2 Cars, Horse and Wagon Captured

LIQUOR IN CITY

W. J. Quinn and Samuel Burchill Taken—Harry E. Stone Breaks Away

TWO automobiles, a horse and wagon, 144 cases of contraband liquors of different brands and four men were gathered in by Inland Revenue officers early this morning near Musquash.

The men, W. J. Quinn and Dennis Burchill, were taken before Magistrate Allingham in Lancaster at noon and fined \$200 each.

Harry E. Stone, who was also arrested, broke from the officers and escaped and a warrant is out for his arrest.

Samuel Burchill, who was a driver of one of the cars, will be brought to court later.

C. B. Lockhart, Collector of Customs here, told The Times-Star that 10 of the officers of his staff were taken to the Musquash district this morning about 9 o'clock, after having received information that liquor was being landed there.

LIQUOR IN AUTOS. The party drove down in a car. They went in a back road in the rear of an ice house and found a large touring car with 50 cases of liquor, driven by W. J. Quinn, who was accompanied by Harry E. Stone. The car was seized and the men placed under arrest.

Quinn and Burchill were brought to the city and taken to the police court, where it was found that Henderson had no jurisdiction, and the men were then taken to the court of Magistrate W. H. Allingham in Lancaster, where they were adjudged guilty of breach of the Revenue Act and fined \$200 each, with the option of three months in jail.

Mr. Lockhart said that a warrant issued for the arrest of Harry E. Stone. Samuel Burchill would be brought to court later, Mr. Lockhart said.

The liquor which was seized was being hauled from the beach, where it had been landed, and the vehicles were being driven toward the city when the officers met them in the road and made the seizure.

OTHER ARRESTS LIKELY. It is understood that the revenue officers have been sent to the Musquash district for several days, and their information was that a large quantity of liquor was to be landed. Mr. Lockhart said that other arrests were likely to follow.

ROY MEETS TERRIBLE DEATH IN BAKERY

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., April 27.—Michael Marino, 16 years of age, was fatally injured, when he was drawn into an electric dough mixing machine in a bakery across the river and died in an hour, without recovering consciousness.

THRILLING MIDNIGHT RESCUE IN HARBOR

Graft Found In Detroit Civic Administration, Judge Urges Warrants Issue For 19 Persons

DETROIT, April 27.—Scathing denunciation of graft, corruption and extravagance which he said he found in city departments, and which cost Detroit taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars, Judge Frank Murphy, representing the findings of his one-man grand jury inquiry into city affairs, recommends the issuance of warrants for 19 persons, including city officials, on charges ranging from conspiracy and embezzlement to larceny.

Those for whom Judge Murphy directed that warrants be issued, and the suggested charges, included: Bart Manning, vice-president of the Union Trust Company, conspiracy to defraud; John A. Mercier, wealthy paving contractor, conspiracy; John J. Knight, former superintendent of street and alley cleaning, malfeasance in office; George Garner, former head of the city sidewalk division, malfeasance in office; Werner Heimholdt, former superintendent of motor transport, and John Mar, foreman in the city garage, conspiracy to extort and accept money.

Graft and corruption were found in the board of education, the department of public works, the parks and boulevard department, the water board, and also in connection with the purchase of a county morgue site, the report said.

LIFE PRISONER FOR MURDER; WINS \$30,000 IN STATE LOTTERY

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, April 27.—Karl Puskas, who is serving a life term in prison for the murder of his wife, has drawn the capital prize of 1,000,000 crowns (about \$30,000) in the state lottery. But he will not have the privilege of spending any of the money. The entire sum is to be deposited to Puskas' credit in a local bank and it will go to his five-year-old son, when the father dies. It is believed the fortune will double within 20 years.

MEDICINE HAT, April 27.—John Kollavich was found guilty here late Saturday of the murder of J. C. Calkins, C. P. R. brakeman, who was killed on March 9. Sentence of death was passed by Justice Ives. The penalty will be executed July 8.

RATIBOR, Silesia, Germany, April 27.—An erroneous report published here last evening that Dr. Marx was leading Von Hindenburg by nearly 2,000,000 votes caused serious disturbances. Large bodies of nationalists began marching through the streets. There were repeated collisions with the security police, and the police used their black-jacks freely. The nationalists collected reinforcements, and laid siege to the police headquarters in various towns in the area.

RIVER LEVEL RISES AS SNOW MELTS

FIELD MARSHAL GETS PLURALITY OVER DR. MARX

COMMUNIST CANDIDATE IS LEFT WELL BEHIND IN VOTING

RESULT DISTURBS

BERLIN, April 27.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's "front porch" campaign, conducted from his home in Hanover, has been successful, and next week he will be inducted into office as the first popularly elected President of Germany.

BRITAIN, FRANCE AND U. S. ON ANXIOUS STAKE OVER SELECTION OF AGED WARRIOR

Running as the choice of the Nationalist-Conservative bloc, consisting of the parties of the United Right, he received 18,629,899 votes, or 48.9 per cent. of the total valid ballots cast in yesterday's polling. He obtained a plurality of 886,774 over his principal opponent, former chancellor Dr. Wilhelm Marx, candidate of the republican bloc, who received 18,723,640 votes. Ernst Thaelman, the Communist, trailed with 1,861,891.

MARKET REACTS TO GERMAN ELECTION

German Bonds Fall, Franc Drops and Wall Street is Affected.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Establishment of a record low price of 92, 1/2 points, by the German government 7 per cent bonds, which were floated in this country, following Germany's acceptance of the Dawes plan, a drop of 3 1/2 cents, and a reactionary movement in the stock market, was Wall Street's first reaction to the election of General Von Hindenburg, as president of the German Republic.
