FINANCES OF ORPHANS' HOME

PRESENT POSITION VERY SATISFACTORY

Interesting Statement of Progress During Last Year Presented at Meeting of Subscribers.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

At the thirty-fourth annual meeting of the subscribers to the British Columbia Protestant Orphans' Home, held in the city hall on Tuesday, President Hayward presented the following report, which was laid on the table for adoption.

Ladies and Gentlemen:—Your committee of management in submitting their 34th annual report have pleasure in congratulating the subscribers on the continued usefulness and prosperity of the institution. There are 48 little ones in the Home receiving of your bounty and the requisite moral, intellectual and physical equipment for the discharge of their duties as good citizens in developing the manifold resources of the country, and at the same time we hope will help to maintain our high character as an industrious and law-abiding people. It is necessary to explain the financial statement of the Home for the year ending on the 31st of December, 1905. The meeting is held several months earlier than usual in order to comply with the provisions of our constitution, thus reducing our present financial year to one of ten months.

It is encouraging, however, to know that although the expenditure for the year has been larger than for many years past, and that our present financial position is extremely satisfactory. A full statement of the receipts and expenditures, kindly audited by Jas. L. Baymut, will be presented by our honorary treasurer, E. Crow Baker. The generous liberality of the subscribers will, we hope, be sufficient to enable the incoming managers to carry out the needed improvements and alterations, and especially to see that the Home is provided with systematic and thorough oversight of the children, and leaving the Home is becoming more and more apparent. At the most critical period of their lives girls and boys are removed from the welfare of the Home and are left almost dependent upon strangers. It is then that friendly help and advice are needed, and there should be some one charged with special duty to visit, encourage and watch over them. Some of the expense involved might be shared with kindred societies and possibly aided by government grant. It having been determined by good authority that the Home is inconsistent with the constitution of the Benevolent Societies Act, it became necessary to revise and amend them. To this work your committee have given very careful attention, endeavoring while conforming to the letter of the declaration to embrace in the new by-laws the spirit of the old ones, and it is earnestly hoped that you will receive your kind attention and formal approval.

A report from the ladies' committee will also be laid before you. This committee have, as in the past, continued in charge of the internal affairs of the Home, thus relieving the management of the many cares and duties, besides also assisting in various ways in augmenting our funds. The ladies have been deeply indebted to the ladies for their efficient and economical management of this branch of the work.

In her absence, which was greatly regretted, the meantime being occupied by the former much beloved matron, Miss Hyndes. The annual party was, we think, a greater success this year than on previous occasions, each pound of food distributed being shared with kindred and at the same time being a great factor in relieving the exchequer.

PROPOSED UNION OF CHURCHES

REPRESENTATIVES HOLD MEETING IN TORONTO

Replies Received From the Anglican and Baptist Bodies—Report on Doctrine.

Toronto, Dec. 13.—One hundred representatives of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches of the Dominion assembled at the schoolroom of the Metropolitan Methodist church to-day to continue the consultation about a basis of church union. Dr. Carmen presided.

In view of the action taken by the general assembly at the last session in London, it was decided to appoint a committee consisting of two Methodists, four Presbyterians and two Congregationalists, to conduct negotiations with the Anglican and Baptist churches regarding the possibility of the Baptists and Anglicans accepting an invitation to take part in the conference. The Baptists wished the union movement God-speed, but did not say whether they would at present join in it. The responses of all the Anglican bishops were cordial and hopeful, but as the general synod of the Church of England will not meet until 1908, no action could be taken by that church until then. These matters were left without discussion in the hands of the sub-committee.

The report of the sub-committee on doctrine was presented by the secretary, Rev. T. B. Hyde. The few alterations suggested from the report submitted previously were mere verbal changes, and nothing fundamental was altered.

The report on church property was presented by the secretary, Rev. Walter Murray, of Dalhousie University, N. S. It likewise contained few alterations, and was adopted. The report on administration, of which Rev. Dr. E. D. MacLaren is secretary, reported that three conferring denominations have the following numbers of ordained ministers in Canada: Methodist, 1,790; Presbyterians, 1,506; Congregationalists, 150. There are 12 Methodist colleges and six Presbyterian. The Methodists have 52 ministers engaged as professors, editors, etc.; Presbyterians, 41, and the Congregationalists, 4.
