The tariff has little to do with the question of living," was his opinion. "What the spending classes have most to lear is rather the danger of trade combinations which will raise prices to abnormal rates."

In conclusion, Sir Robert regretted the fact that the Methodist Church in Canada now takes second rank numerically in the Dominion. He partly accounted for this by the amazing failure of Canadian Methodism to make use of the lay preacher. TORONTO, Jane 6.—At hast night's session of the Presbyterian Assembly the Home Mission Committee of the Eastern and Western sections of the Presbyterian Church in Canada reported to the Assembly.

Mrs. Kipp gave an interesting talk about Sydney.

Rev. Dr. Forrest, of Halifax, presented the work of the Eastern section, and Dr. Amaron madea attriling address upon the work in Quebec.

Rev. Mr. McWhinney told of the work among the Indians, and the Rev. S. Glow told of the work among the Ruthenians.

The Presbyteries report showed 168,073 Presbyterian families in the Dominion and 34,049 single persons. Allowing five persons to the family this gives a total of \$74,414 members of the Church, which the report contrasts with the 1,115,324 Presbyterians discovered by the last Dominion census takers, and draws the inference that the balance, 240,910, are not actively connected with any congregation. Families reported show an increase of 4,225 and 15,808 individuals united on profession of faith. "When we come to the financial side of the report we come out of the shadows into the sun," declares the report, in drawing attention to an increase of \$507, 102 in the amount raised by the Church for all purposes during the year, the figure being \$5,417,163.

The amount given by congregations for schemes of the church was \$770,083 37, being an increase over last year of \$166.
