Hon. A. G. Blair on the Late New Brunswick Elections. Hon. A. G. Blair, Minister of Railways and Canals, was interviewed at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, a few days after the New Brunswick election, by a representative of the Herald of that city. He said, in part: "On my return from England last summer, on learning of the action which Mr. Foster had taken and what had transpired at the Montreal election, I thought I could foresee that the result would be injurious, if not disastrous, to the Conservative party in that Province."

What about the other three seats? "Other three seats are now held by gentlemen who have been elected to parliament as Conservatives, but who have been practically driven out of the ranks by the declared policy of Mr. Foster and his leader, Sir Charles Tupper. Of course, it will be for these gentlemen and their friends to say how far they can resist the determination of Sir Charles and the ex-finance minister to expel them from the party rank."
