VERY INSTRUCTIVE.

The illustrated St. John edition of
the Canadian Trade Review has come
to hand. It is perhaps fair to say that
nowhere will the publication be read
with greater interest than in St. John
itself. The reason is that a careful
perusal of the journal will convey to
the citizens a varied mass of informa-
tion, some of which is quite new. Nat-
urally, one of the first things the Star
wanted to know was the matured opin-
ion of the Trade Review with respect
to the press of St. John; and on search-
ing the pages carefully these valuable
suggestions were exposed to view: "The
evening papers are the Gazette, a
standard conservative paper and a
welcome visitor at our exchange table;
the Globe, liberal; and the Record, in-
dependent."

With an appetite for accurate knowl-
edge whetted by these disclosures the
Star began a careful study of the six-
teen pages of illustrations, which are
printed on loose sheets and thrown to-
gether into the middle of the book. It
was learned that a little picture re-
vealing one of the deer in Rockwood
Park was a "Scene in the New Brun-
swick Forests," and that a well known
rustic club house near Fredericton was
a "Camp in the New Brunswick
Woods." The Church of the Assump-
tion in Carleton appears as St. Peter's
church, and Trinity church is elevated
to the dignity of an "Anglican Cathed-
ral." The Victoria school appears as
the Centennial, and vice versa. A view
of the St. John river away up in Carle-
ton county is described as a view at
St. John. But most instructive of the
views is that of the "Daily Telegraph
building on the back cover of the book."
It towers aloft to an extent that makes
the Gazette building appear like a
woodbox. Gaily moving about the
busy street are groups of stylishly
dressed people, and a number of ve-
hicles, the like of which are never seen
in St. John. The "growing time" ap-
pears to have strangely and powerfully
affected the artist who made the
drawing for the valued Telegraph.

From the text of the nine pages de-
voted to descriptive matter, six of the
nine being advertisements of business
houses, written in the customary style
of such treatises, it is learned that the
cold storage plant is now in process of
erection in the north end. We read
here of Germand street, and such
names as The P. Hayward Co., Han-
derson, Hunt & McLaughlin, H. T. Fin-
ley, Scott Bros. & Co. Clothing, J. M.
Humphreys & Co., Hall & Fair-
weather Co., Ltd., Merritt Bros. & Co.
The St. John matter is not printed in
the ordinary large type of the rest of
the journal, but in nonpareil, and the
press work being of a kind peculiar to
itself the reader finds it an interesting
study, if rather hard on the eyes, to
read the various articles. The sixteen
pages of illustrations are, good, but
are not a part of the book, nor even
stitched or pasted together.
When the representative of the Trade
Review came to the city and told his
story the newspapers treated him with
courtesy, the board of trade and tour-
ist association gave him information,
and the city council gave a grant of a
hundred dollars. The merchants gave
him advertisements and bought copies
of the journal at a high price. If any
reader of this article is curious to
know what the merchants think about
it, let him ask them, having first tak-
en the precaution to have the door op-
en, and a clear field for a hurried de-
parture.

MARCONI WINS.

NEW YORK, March 22.—Justice Cox
in the United States circuit court has
dismissed the injunction suit of Ler-
man C. Learner, against Guglielmo
Marconi, the Italian inventor. Learn-
er, asked further for \$100,000 damages.
Learner brought suit as the assignee
of the United States of A. E. Dolbear,
of Boston, and alleged in his complaint
that Dolbear was the original inventor
of the system of wireless telegraphy.
Patents had been issued to Dolbear in
December 1888 and October 1888. Mar-
coni's invention, he said, by reason of
faults in the invention and Marconi had
therefore made use of Dolbear's sys-
tem.
Marconi, in his reply, admitted that
patents had been issued to Dolbear,
but said there had never been a prac-
tical demonstration of the commercial
value of the inventions. He denied
having infringed on Dolbear's rights.
Dr. J. A. Fleming, professor of elec-
trical engineering in the University
college, London, and Charles R. Cross,
Thayer, prof. of physics in the Massa-
chusetts institute of technology, were
witnesses for Marconi.

A MONSTER STEAMER.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The Ko-
rea, which was launched today at the
Newport News Shipbuilding company's
works, bears the distinction of being
up to date the largest steam vessel ever
built on this side of the Atlantic.
With a length of 372 feet four inches
and a beam of 63 feet she will displace
18,000 tons on a draught of 27
feet. Some idea of the size of the Ko-
rea may be derived from the fact that
from the top to the bottom of the bare
masts is a distance of 40 feet, while the
distance around her rail is nearly a
quarter of a mile.
She is designed for the Pacific Mail
Steamship Company.

GOOD NEWS FROM PHILIPPINES.

NEW YORK, March 22.—Advices
from the Philippines are so encourag-
ing for peace, says the Washington
correspondent of the press, that the
war department is considering the ad-
visability of reducing the garrisons in
the Archipelago. The re-organized
army will be recruited to the full
strength of 100,000 men, but it is believed
that further requirements will not
exceed this maximum. About 3,000 regulars
will be entitled to their discharge in
the current year. It is proposed to let
these soldiers return to their homes
and not to fill their places.

THE WEATHER.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Fore-
cast: Eastern states and northern
New York—Increasing cloudiness to-
night; rains Sunday, warmer, fresh to
brisk easterly to southeasterly winds.
TORONTO, March 22.—Fine mid-
day, wind shifting to southeast,
fair, mild until night, then a change
to stormy conditions likely.

STRINGENT MARRIAGE LAW.

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 22.—The
state senate yesterday re-considered
and finally passed Senator Chilton's
bill prohibiting the marriage of in-
sane, epileptic and idiotic persons and
requiring a medical certificate of all
applicants for marriage licenses.

SETTLED.

Rev. Fr. Gaynor Given Permission
to See Ella Goodine.

The misunderstanding between the
Rev. Father Gaynor and the manage-
ment of the Salvation Army Mater-
nity Home has been amicably adjust-
ed. Yesterday, Brigadier Sharpe, the
new officer in charge of the province,
who arrived on Thursday from New-
foundland, after full enquiry into the
matter, sent word to Fr. Gaynor that
he would be pleased to have him visit
the girl Ella Goodine. Fr. Gaynor ac-
cordingly went down to the Home
about 6:30 last evening, and prepared
the unfortunate young woman for
death.

Father Gaynor told the Sun last
night that he was glad the disagree-
ment had been so satisfactorily settled
and that henceforth he would have the
entire to the institution.
Miss Ellis, the head nurse, when
seen by the Sun, said the case had
been passed upon by the local head
of the army. She had only carried out
the rules of the institution, but had
this girl at any time expressed a wish
to see any particular clergyman he
would have been promptly sum-
moned. Ella Goodine, however, though
repeatedly asked by her, never expres-
sed a desire to see Father Gaynor, al-
though she received him willingly
when he came yesterday.

HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, March 22.—At a meeting of
the fresh fish shippers today the govern-
ment was asked to issue licenses for Ameri-
can fishing schooners to avail themselves of
the privileges of the coast, and to permit
that fresh fish from Boston, Portland and
Gloucester is capturing the Toronto and
Knox markets.
The shippers also recommended raising
the Canadian duty from one half cent per
pound to one cent per pound, the same as the
American duty.
Premier Murray introduced a bill in the
assembly today authorizing the govern-
ment to establish an agricultural college.
Canada Pacific has the Halifax sailing
steamer Newfoundland has arrived at St.
Johns with 20,000 seals, worth \$300,000.

MONCTON.

MONCTON, March 22.—The city council
was called on tonight by a deputation repre-
senting the Fraternal Alliance and Temper-
ance societies. Rev. David Hutchinson of
the First Baptist church was spokesman.
He asked that the funds from the Scott
act be applied to the enforcement of the
act, which should be enforced as laws
against theft, and that officers failing in duty
be dismissed. They said they did not want
the government to continue the annual

a lot of paving blocks from John E.
Moore for twenty-five cents a yard.
Tenders were then opened for paving
blocks for this year's supply, as fol-
lows:
J. R. Warner & Co., 1,500 yards at 60
cents.
Murray & Gregory, 6,000 yards at 50
cents.
J. A. Gregory, 1,000 yards at 50 cents.
Maritime Casket Co., 17,000 yards at
70 cents.

The first three tenders were ac-
cepted for the supply of 8,500 yards.
After the engineer reports on the
quantity purchased from J. E. Moore,
action will be taken as to the balance
required.

The estimates were then taken up
and the following recommended:

Asphalt 6,000
Retaining walls 1,500
Street plants 1,000
Granite curbing 900
Public grounds and old burial
ground 1,000
Bridges and fences 400
New houses 2,500
New horses 500
New work (including \$7,500 for
sewerage purposes) 2,000
\$15,000

The matter of an assessment for fer-
ry purposes was left over for Friday.
Ald. Maxwell moved that the clause
requiring the Cushing Sulphite Co. to
leave the floor in the sulphur ware-
house be struck out.
The motion was carried by the cast-
ing vote of the chairman.
The claim of W. E. Scully for dam-
ages, was left to Ald. Millidge, Col-
well and the superintendent of streets.
A map of the city, prepared by the en-
gineer, is to be hung in the committee
room.
The report of the superintendent of
streets was read. It recommends the
same amount of work to be done upon
Millidgeville road as last year; also
that only absolutely necessary repair
work be done during the year, confin-
ing the city's energies as far as pos-
sible to permanent work. The report
was ordered to be printed with the
public accounts.

On suggestion of the chairman,
some rock near Mr. Hamm's residence
on Douglas avenue is to be removed
and used for retaining walls in that
vicinity.

SHIPBUILDING IN CANADA.


Hopeful Prospects of the Revival of a
Profitable Industry.

(Montreal Witness, 20th.)

Shipbuilding, as an outcome of the
establishment of the Dominion Iron
and Steel company, has not been an
accomplished fact, either at Halifax,
Sydney or St. John, but, according to
Harvey Harding, of St. John and J. H.
Thomson, of the St. John shipbuilding
firm of William Thomson & Company,
who are at present in the city, the
prospects are bright. Provisional di-
rectors have actually been appointed
and the capital of the company has
been fixed at \$3,000,000. Mr. Harding
says the enterprise is a little beyond
the initial stage, and he has the strong-
est reason to believe that capitalists
all over the Dominion will rally to it—
seeing that success will be assured from
the start: The project of such an en-
terprise would be a corollary to the
establishment of the Dominion Iron and
Steel company's works. The gentle-
men who controlled the latter would
not perhaps be officially connected
with the shipbuilding project, but they
would certainly be friendly, while Mr.
Harding thought that leading capital-
ists of Montreal would be as pleased to
see shipbuilding on the Atlantic sea-
board of Canada, as those who reside
in the lower provinces.

Mr. Thomson calculated that if a
plant were installed in Canada, five
steamers could be put on, and the
first steamer would be delivered in,
say, about six months and a half. The
Clyde firms were rather slow, as gener-
ally a year elapses between the giv-
ing of a contract and the launching of
the ship. Besides, they still do their
riveting by hand, while on this side
this work is all done automatically.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

In the local legislature yesterday Mr.
Lablache, replying to Mr. Hazen and
others gave particulars concerning cer-
tain bridge contracts and other work
of that kind. In reference to the bill
to incorporate the New Brunswick
Southern Railway Co. Hon. Mr. Hill
said the company desired to purchase
the Shore Line; to improve it greatly
and make connection with the St. John
bridge.
The following bills were introduced:
By Mr. O'Brien, to amend the
Alberto Oil Co.; by Hon. Mr. Farris,
to authorize the formation of Farm-
ers' Institutes. (Mr. Farris said it
was proposed to form institutes among
the farmers similar to those in On-
tario. The government was spending
annually about \$1,900 for the annual
farmers' meetings, and they thought
that this money would be better ex-
pended in local farmers' institute
meetings. The Dominion government
would continue the annual farmers'
meetings, and after that time the
bill to incorporate the Maritime pulp
and Paper Co. By Mr. Todd, to in-
corporate the St. Croix Electric Light
and Water Co. By Hon. Mr. Mc-
Keown, to authorize the city of St.
John to aid a steel ship building com-
pany.

BILLS ASSENTED TO.

The governor came to the house at
4 o'clock and assented to the follow-
ing bills:
An act to amend the Game Act, 1899.
An act further relating to provincial
revenues and accounts.
An act to incorporate fishermen's
bait associations.
An act to aid in the erection of cold
storage warehouses.
An act to provide for the prepara-
tion of a legal list of voters for the
parish of Rothesay, in the county of
Kings, for the present year, and to
further amend the New Brunswick
Elections Act of 1899.

An act relating to public officers on
demise of the crown.
An act to amend the Act 62, Victoria,
chapter 30, relating to rates and
taxes.
An act to provide for the develop-
ment of the coal areas in the counties
of Queens and Sunbury.
An act in amendment and addition
to the Act George 14, chapter 28, en-
titled an act to empower the rectors,
church wardens, and vestry of Trinity
church in the parish of St. John
to dispose of lots in the new burial
ground in the vicinity of the said
parish.
An act relating to the city of Mon-
cton.

THE EXHIBITION ASSOCIATION.

The meeting of the shareholders of
the Exhibition Association was held
yesterday afternoon. There was a
large attendance, and after a full dis-
cussion, the following resolution was
adopted: Resolved, That this meet-
ing confirm the decision of the direc-
tors that it will not be possible to hold
an exhibition without a provincial
grant of \$5,000.
And further resolved, That the pro-
vincial government be again request-
ed to make a grant of at least \$5,000
towards an exhibition to be held dur-
ing the year.
And further resolved, That in view
of the fact that the members of this
association and the citizens of St.
John having in the past borne more
than their equitable share of the fi-
nancial burdens of the association, and
the benefits from the exhibition hav-
ing gone to the province at large, that
it is the opinion of this meeting that
should the request for assistance from
the government not be complied with,
it is advisable to close up the affairs
of the association; as it is deemed not
just to again appeal to the individual
citizens to make up any deficit that
might be incurred.
And falling the grant, he further
resolved, That the city council and
the provincial government be asked for
a sum sufficient to pay off the present
liabilities.
