### Synopsis of Canadian North- west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of  
a family, or any male over 18 years old,  
may homestead a quarter-section of  
available Dominion land in Manitoba,  
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The ap-  
plicant must appear in person at the Do-  
minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency  
for the district. Entry by proxy may  
be made at any agency, on certain  
conditions, by father, mother, son,  
daughter, brother or sister of intend-  
ing homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon  
cultivation of the land in each of  
three years. A homesteader may live  
within nine miles of his homestead on  
a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-  
ed and occupied by him or by his  
father, mother, son, daughter, brother  
or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in  
good standing may pre-empt a quar-  
ter-section alongside his homestead.  
Price \$10.00 per acre. 12 miles.—Must re-  
side six months in each of six years  
from date of homestead entry (includ-  
ing the time required to earn home-  
stead patent) and cultivate fifty acres  
extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted  
his homestead right at 1 cannot obtain  
a pre-emption may, if he has purchased  
homestead in certain districts. Price  
\$50.00 per acre. Duty 1/2.—Must reside  
six months in each of three years, cul-  
tivate fifty acres and erect a house  
worth \$200.00.

## DIES ONE HOUR AFTER SHAKING FRIEND'S HAND

The strength of boyhood attachment  
was very strongly exemplified in con-  
nection with the death of Daniel Sisk  
of Pokesaw, Gloucester county. Ed-  
ward McGrath, keeper of the Union  
station, was concerned in the incident.  
The hope of seeing his old playmate  
once again appeared to be the only  
thing which kept Mr. Sisk alive, for he  
died with an hour after he had grasped  
Mr. McGrath's hand for the last time.  
Forty years ago the two men were boy  
chums at Pokesaw, the native place  
of both. The same school building held  
them both, and out of school they were  
inseparable. They fished and swam to-  
gether, each made the other's home his,  
and their friends and enemies were all  
mutual.

Since leaving the North Shore vil-  
lage Mr. McGrath never revisited the  
scene of his boyhood until a few weeks  
ago, when he found it possible to  
gratify his friend's greatest desire by  
visiting him at Pokesaw, a visit which  
was to be his last.

Two months ago Mr. Sisk saw Mr.  
McGrath for a few hours while in St.  
John on his way home from Boston.  
Brief as the reunion was, it loosened a  
flood of boyhood recollections, and when  
Mr. Sisk returned home his mind kept  
turning to the old playmate.

At six o'clock he was dead. He had  
his sole thought and topic of conversa-  
tion, and when Mrs. Gallagher, Mr.  
McGrath's sister, visited Pokesaw re-  
cently, Mr. Sisk bade her not to give  
her brother any peace until he should  
make the trip.

Finally it was accomplished. Mr.  
McGrath's arrival, which took place at  
5 p. m. and Mr. Sisk's last words were  
to him, as he rose to bed and grasped  
his old chum's hand in both of his,  
at six o'clock he was dead.

Mr. Sisk was for 27 years a section  
foreman on the Canadian branch rail-  
road. His funeral was the largest ever  
seen on the North Shore. As the chief  
mourner he carried the casket. Flurries  
were on the way they could see that  
the rear carriages were still crossing  
the bridge, known to be a mile away.
