

DROWNING ACCIDENT AT SEASIDE PARK

Albert Ryder a Young Married Man Lost His Life About Six O'clock Saturday Night, While Bathing Near the Shore--Body Was Recovered About Two Hours Later in Eight Feet of Water

While the Saturday pleasure seekers crowded together at Seaside Park, the beach just below the street railway grounds was the scene of a sad drowning accident, by which Albert Ryder, a moulder, in the employ of McLean, Holt & Co., lost his life.

Coroner McFarland of Fairville, who had arrived just at this time, viewed the remains. No efforts were made at resuscitation. The body was taken up into one of the park buildings where, a permit having been granted by the coroner, it was taken to his late residence, 10 Pond street.
