## SIR WM. VANHORNE SICK AND DISGUSTED

Reciprocity Agreement Letting  
Down Mill Dam—Sifton and  
Free Press to Come Out  
Against Treaty.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—Sir William Van  
Horne has just returned from Cuba,  
highly disgusted at the proposal put  
forward to carry through the Fielding-  
Paterson reciprocity measure.  
"I am too much disgusted to talk  
about it," he said today. "Just think  
of it. Our government returns show  
that the commerce per capita of the  
people of Canada is \$37 per head,  
while the commerce per capita of the  
people of the United States is \$33  
and some 55 cents per head. Natu-  
rally they look on us with a covetous  
eye and this proposal for reciprocity  
is their's. Now we are actually pro-  
posing to remove the mill dam, and  
you know what happens when the mill  
dam is removed—the waters find a  
common level. It is humiliating and  
disgusting to find such a deal as this  
one proposed by Messrs. Fielding and  
Paterson being seriously entertained.  
I won't trust myself to say another  
word about it. Here, just say that my  
opinions on the subject are summed  
up in the following," and Sir William  
sat down at his desk and wrote:  
"Re reciprocity agreement—I am  
sick and disgusted to say anything about  
the subject."

Montreal will soon be heard from  
in thunder tones against the anti-na-  
tional agreement. A meeting will  
take place within a short time,  
with party lines absolutely wiped out,  
and the very foremost men of the  
metropolis as speakers on the plat-  
form. Satisfaction is general over the  
announcement that Hon. Clifford Sif-  
ton will soon deliver a great speech  
against the measure, followed by the  
Free Press going into opposition to the  
hated arrangement.

## HOUSE BURNED AT UPPER MAUGERVILLE

Fredericton, Feb. 28.—A Scotch  
family named Campbell, who removed  
to Upper Maugerville, were burned  
out at that place yesterday afternoon,  
the house being destroyed with nearly  
all its contents except some things  
in the lower flat of the house. The  
fire caught at noon while Mr. Camp-  
bell and his sons were away in the  
woods. The eldest daughter and five  
children were home at the time.

When the fire broke out the daugh-  
ter, who was in the house, and was with  
difficulty rescued from the flames. A  
large number of the men of the neigh-  
borhood were in the woods, but those  
who were nearby did their best at  
fighting the fire and trying to save  
the furniture. The fire burned for  
about two hours, and when Mr. Camp-  
bell and his sons returned they found  
their home in ashes. It is understood  
that the house was partly covered by  
insurance, but that the furniture was  
uninsured.
