FOREIGN NEWS
TOLD IN BRIEFTrade Agreement Between
Canada and Australia has
been Reached—Picturesque
Character Dead.

London, May 10.—Hon. Sydney Tudor, the Australian minister of trade and customs, and the Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Canadian minister of trade and commerce, have arrived at a general agreement regarding trade between the Commonwealth and the Dominion. The schedules will be discussed after Mr. Foster's visit to Tasmania. Both ministers express their keen gratification with regard to the agreement.

New York, May 10.—"Chuck" Connors is dead. The picturesque character of the old Bowery, best known perhaps as the "mayor of Chinatown," died of heart disease in the Hudson street hospital today.

The secrets of Chinatown's dark hallways, alleys and hidden shadows had been his for many years. Slant-eyed veterans of his warring Tonges, the four brothers of the Hip Sing Tong, and the On Leong Tong, declared a truce when the news of his death became known, and will march shoulder to shoulder in a parade to honor his memory. "Chuck" was 61 years old. Most of his life was spent in Chinatown. Of late he had made a living as guide to sightseeing parties visiting his stamping ground.

Chicago, Ill., May 10.—The members of the Socialist party national committee are gathering in Chicago for the first representative Socialist conference that has been held since the appearance of the Progressive party and the establishment of the new political alignment. The conference will review the present political situation and discuss plans for the congressional and legislative campaigns of next year.

San Francisco, May 10.—James V. Martin, who holds a pilot's license for the air and a master license for the seas, on Friday announced on his arrival from the Hawaiian Islands, that he would attempt to cross the Atlantic next August in competition for the first aviator to make the journey inside of seventy hours. With him will be his wife, formerly Miss Lillian Irvine, who says she was the first English woman to fly. The air-line he will attempt to follow is 1,635 miles long and he expects to make a non-stop flight in a specially built French biplane.

Stockholm, May 10.—A smallpox epidemic is scouring Stockholm. A Swedish workman, home from Russia, is infected with the disease. There are in the hospital 35 cases. There is a great rush for vaccination. Nearly half of the inhabitants have been vaccinated during the past few days.

NEW HEAD OF I.C.R.
REACHES MONCTON TODAY

Moncton, N. B., May 10.—I. C. R. officials F. P. Brady, R. W. Simpson and Secretary Rushton of the I. C. R., left today for the north to meet F. P. Gutelius, the new head of the Intercolonial, and accompany him to the city, arriving here on the Maritime express on Monday morning.

It is understood that F. P. Brady will remain in the employ of the road as general superintendent. J. B. T. Caron as general solicitor and E. T. T. traffic manager. Also that D. P. Pottinger, who has long been in the service of the railway, will be superannuated, but this report has not been confirmed.

DIGBY SHIPPING NOTES.

Digby, N.S., May 10.—The fleet of schooners detained here for favorable winds was sent to sea today, including the three-master Catherine, lumber laden, for Cienfuegos.

The Norwegian barque Nature, after a long, boisterous passage from Glasgow, in ballast, arrived here today, and is detained at quarantine before proceeding to Annapolis to load lumber for South America.

Schooner Agnes G. Donahoe, before reported leaking, was towed from here to Annapolis to discharge cargo of coal, after which she goes on the blocks for examination. The vessel did not go on the marine railway at Yarmouth as reported from there.

COD NOUSURY IN
ANCIENT COLONY

The St. John's Herald gives these figures relating to the cod catch the past few years, which are extremely instructive:

"In the year ending June 30, 1909, the total catch was 1,732,387 quintals, but the value of this big export totalled up to only \$7,398,536, the price per quintal that year averaging only \$4.27. In the year that ended on June 30, 1912, the catch was only 1,388,178 quintals, that is to say \$4,428,000 less than for 1909. But the price averaged \$5.77 per quintal for the total 1912 catch and the total value—\$8,001,703—was greater by \$60,167 than it was three years before.

"Fishing is expected to begin much earlier than last year, as the coast-cleared of ice early. High prices last season have encouraged the industry and as many men and schooners are expected to fish as last year.

"The Norwegian catch is very much short of that of last year, and there are only about 150,000 quintals now remaining unsold in all the stores of St. John's.

"At the present rate of clearance there will practically be no fish left by the end of June. The removal of the duty on our green fish going into the United States will also be an important factor in securing a high price the coming season. It is presumed that a great deal of the fish caught by the Bankers out of Grand Bank, Fortune, Beloram, St. Jacques, etc., will not be made into dry salt fish, but will be taken to Gloucester and Boston and sold green. This will prevent the Mediterranean markets from being stocked heavily with new fish in July next as so often happened in the past, and which contributed largely to bring about a low opening market price for the rest of the season, and which contributed to the loss of the fishery.

"It will be seen then from all these conditions that the fishery outlook the coming summer is very bright for our people."
