

RAILWAY PREPARED TO LEASE SECTION TO SUPERIOR JCT.

Grand Trunk Pacific Will Offer
No Objection to Instructions
to Take the Line Over.

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—Chairman Smithers and President E. J. Chamberlain, representing the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, are returning from their tour of inspection in the West, and will, it is believed, confer with members of the government regarding the operation of the section of the National Transcontinental from Transcona to Superior Junction. It is assumed here that the company will not object to leasing the line.

There is no confirmation of the report that W. B. Cronk has been appointed to operate the section. Chairman Leonard and the Minister of Railways are both out of Ottawa. Officials here never heard of the appointment.

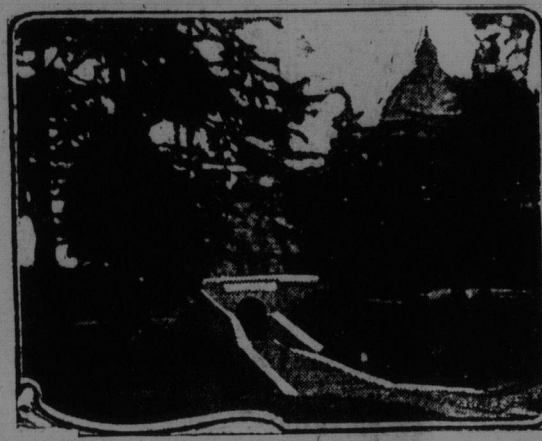

POPE FINDS RELIEF FROM TOURISTS IN TUNNEL TO VATICAN GARDENS

Rome, Aug. 30.—Pope Plus X has solved the problem of the American tourists, and his own life as well as that of his successors may be considerably lengthened as a result.

For the past fifty years since the unification of Italy, the Pope, who declares himself a prisoner in the Vatican at the hands of the new government of Italy, has had no place in which to exercise save in the Vatican gardens at the rear of the Vatican palace.

Unfortunately, there was no entrance into these gardens for the Pope without first traversing the long walk of the galleries. These galleries were always open to the public and there was scarcely any moment of privacy, any day of the year, that they were not filled with American tourists. As a result
