

POPE FINDS RELIEF FROM TOURISTS IN TUNNEL TO VATICAN GARDENS

Rome, Aug. 20.—Pope Plus X has solved the problem of the American tourists, and his own life is as well as that of his successors may be considerably lengthened as a result. For the past fifty years since the unification of Italy, the Pope, who declares himself a prisoner in the Vatican, has had to take his daily drive or walk either very early in the morning before the galleries opened, or late in the afternoon, when they were closed. A huge tunnel, wide enough for the papal carriage and half a mile long, now leads from beneath the papal apartments under the sculpture and art galleries, and directly into the Vatican gardens at the rear of the Vatican palace.

Unfortunately, there was no entrance into these gardens for the pope until first traversing two miles of sculpture and art galleries. These galleries were always open to the public and there was scarcely any moment of a day, any day of the year, that they were not filled with American tourists. As a result the pope had to take his daily drive or walk either very early in the morning before the galleries opened, or late in the afternoon, when they were closed.

By means of the one elevator in the Vatican, and his daily ride or walk is now taken at whatever hour he wants it and without the fatigue of the long walk about that was formerly necessary to take before the American tourists are in no way whatsoever disturbed.


