

## WERNER HORN HAS LODGINGS CHANGED

**Alleged St. Croix Bridge  
Dynamiter Transferred  
from Plymouth to Dedham  
Jail.**

Boston, Nov. 17.—Werner Horn, the former German lieutenant, who is held in connection with the attempt to blow up the railroad bridge at Vanceboro, over the St. Croix river, last February, has been moved to the jail at Dedham. The reason assigned for the transfer is the impaired condition of Horn's health. He has been in the Plymouth jail since spring. Before that he was in the jail at East Cambridge.

## ST. CROIX TRAMP IS AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

Belfast, Me., Nov. 17.—According to the records of the Waldo county jail William Murdoch, a veteran gentleman of the road, who hails from the vicinity of Calais and St. Stephen, must move as methodically as an eight day clock. Every year about this time, William, who is 77 years of age, puts up an appearance at Belfast and begs to have himself lodged in jail, where he is assured of a fair bed and three meals until the warm weather comes.

The veteran tramp from the St. Croix put in his appearance here rather earlier than usual this year, but so did winter, hence a slight alteration in Murdoch's itinerary. The old man is fairly well dressed, is good natured and has seen better days. He will say little of his past life, which is more or less shrouded in mystery.

## THREE MEN WERE LOST ON O'HARA

**Capt. Dunn, Mate Lannigan  
and Albert Stewart Drown-  
ed When Old Schooner  
Capsized.**

Shediac, Nov. 17.—It developed that three men were drowned when the old schooner W. Parnell O'Hara, from Point du Chene for a North Shore point, capsized outside Malpeque light, P.E.I., recently. Capt. Dunn of Murray Harbor, Mate Lannigan and Albert Stewart of Grand River, P. E. I., were lost.

The O'Hara was built in the United States in 1866 and was valued at \$2,000. Capt. Dunn was 46 years old and unmarried.

Stewart leaves a widow but no children. Capt. Dunn is said to have had \$350 on him when he went down. The schooner was owned by R. J. McNeill of Truro Valley, P. E. I., and had made a number of trips to this harbor.
