IRISH QUESTION BRITAIN'S ALONE MEIGHEN WRITES

Hells Self - Determination League He Cannot Bring Issue Before Conference.

CITES ILLUSTRATION FROM 1882 CASE Sun.

Non-Intervention in Imperial Questions is Principle of fe Government.

The following letter has passed between the Prime Minister and the National Executive of the Self-Determination League:—

Ottawa, June 4, 1921.

Dear Sir:—I have considered your letter of June 2nd requesting in behalf of the Self-Determination for Ireland League that during the coming conference in London I should make representations to the Government of the United Kingdom concerning the existing situation in Ireland.

It has always been the position of Canadian Governments that any interference from other parts of the Empire in what are regarded as Canadian domestic affairs is both improper and unconstitutional; and there is no doubt that the Canadian people regard this as a cardinal principle regard this as a cardinal principle regard that they include the relations between the constituent parts of he Dominion. Any step from outside, whether by way of tendering advice or ptherwise, which could be in any collections of the principle regarded as an expression of option or an intervention concerning such relations would, therefore, be strongly resented by Canadians.

Must Not Interfere

Must Not Interfere

This being so it is incumbent upon Canadian Governments to refrain from any intervention in the domestic affairs of other parts of the Empire. The representations you ask me to the total constituent parts of the United Kingdom, and these under the rule we insist upon applying In our own case are the domestic affair of that country. If the Canadian Government should countenance your suggestions they would, therefore, be interfering in a matter which the Government of the United Kingdom are exclusively responsible and would be taking action of a sort which all Canadians if a similar step were taken toward them in a corresponding case, would resent and rightly resent.

As an illustration of the principle it hay be recalled that in 1832 the Canadan Government transmitted to the Government of the United Kingdom a resolution of the House of Commons concerning the Irish question. The reply made by the Government of the United Kingdom to this communication was as follows:

"Her Majesty will always gladly receive the advice of the Parliament of Canada on all matters relating to the Dominion, and the administration of its affairs; but, with respect to the question referred to in the address, Her Majesty, will in accordance with the Constitution of this country have regard to the advice of the Imperial Parliament and Ministers, to whom all matters relating to the affairs of the United Kingdom exclusively appertain." exclusively appertain."

The principle underlying the rule by non-intervention is universally recognized throughout the world as being necessary in the interests of good relations between countries, and experience has proven its wisdom. It would accordingly be improper and unwise for me to take the step you suggest. Western Crop Good

Winnipeg, June 23.—Another week by perfect growing weather has prevailed over practically all of the three weetern provinces, states the weekly rop report of the grain trade news issued today. The splendid crop conditions which have prevailed since the middle of May have continued and the warm humid atmosphere with abundance of rain at most points had induced rapid and rank growth.
