This class of oil in Pennsylvania is quoted at \$7.50 a barrel at the well's mouth, which makes this well produce \$60 per day.

One hundred wells in a district as extensive as the reported oil district of this vicinity, will not be an exaggerated estimate, and an output of \$60 each well would total \$6,000 per day. But the pumping of the wells will be the least individual advantage to the community, the great abor required for the refining and auxiliary industries.
