How Families Subsisted on Credit of Men Whose Lands They Settled—Interesting Characters of the Old Times Here Told Of.

THE OLD COUNTRY OF SUNBURY AND ITS TOWNSHIPS.

Messrs. Hazen & Jarvis and their partners at St. John manifested the greatest interest in the attempts of the Canadian...

Letter of Hazen & Jarvis to James Simonds. Newburyport, Oct. 8th, 1777.

We write you by a ship that came in here from New York for some cattle, sheep and hogs...

There are ten families [of settlers], each of which was to have 100 acres...

Mr. White is arrived with our Wm. Hazen and writes you by this vessel. We suppose he will tell you that we think it will not be best to build a vessel with you this winter.

We have sent all our produce of your memo. by this vessel—the remainder will come by Mr. White who will sail the last of next week.

Please to get as much lime as possible on board Capt. Newman, as we have agreed with him to land it in Portsmouth...

There are 100 sheep on board the sloop which cost upon an average about 6s. 10d. a head...

Since writing the above we have been getting the sheep on board and find several very good which please to take for the Company's use...

We are Sir, Your sincere Friends and devoted hum. Servs. HAZEN & JARVIS.

Who Mr. Livingston was. Philip John Livingston, who has been mentioned as a promoter of the settlement...

About the close of the year 1767 Col. Gasper wrote from New York, seemingly in excellent spirits...

Mr. Pickett and Mr. Hart will give you an account of what freight they have on board which you will receive of them at the customary rate.

The Partners Were Indignant. Simonds & White informed their partners at Newburyport in a letter dated June 22, 1778...

I entered the favour of you last year, to procure two families for Sir Charles Dabers, who purchased the King's No. 18. Some time ago...

As soon as the committee of Montreal will be pleased to furnish us with each we shall write to you about finishing the Mills...

I hope you have taken the cattle from Brooks, or received the worth of them for me and be pleased to inform me particularly of the state of the families...

I am, Sir, Your Much Obligated And Very Humble Servant. PHILIP J. LIVINGSTON.

We may be pretty certain that the complaints of the settlers sent by Livingston were not entirely untrue...

Peter Carr and Thomas Masterson, one of Livingston's tenants, settled on the west side of the river opposite Musquash Island...

John Hendrick, one of Livingston's "ungrateful fellows," was also a valuable settler. He was the father of five sons and Major Studholme commended him in 1783 as a good subject...

Notwithstanding the efforts of individuals, the progress made by the Canada Company as a whole, in the settling of their townships was unsatisfactory...

about this time Hazen & Jarvis expressed their conviction that half of the proprietors would not settle their lands at all...

The township of Sunbury was wholly escheated. Regrants were made to Benjamin Atherton and Phillip Weade at St. Anne's...

New-Town was wholly escheated, but William Hazen received as a recompense for the surrender of his rights in the township of himself and his brother...

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BORDEN SCORES LORD DUNDONALD.

(Continued from page 1.) Township. He was aware through the military secretary by whom the undersigned had sent more than one message to the general officer commanding...

"He was aware that the undersigned was absent in a distant part of the dominion as shown by the letter of Colonel Pinnall, the deputy minister of militia, dated in the memorandum on Colonel Hughes and on the occasion to which he makes reference to the minister of agriculture having stricken off and initiated the name of an officer contained in a list which had been approved of by him, his remarks must have misled his hearers because they did not disclose the fact that Mr. Fisher was then acting minister of militia.

Dundonald Was Not Ignorant. Lord Dundonald was aware that the commanding officer of the regiment, Lieutenant-Colonel Smart, had written to Mr. Fisher on May 10th, requesting him to strike off the name of Dr. Pickett, as will be seen by reference to Col. Smart's letter heretofore quoted.

"He was aware that the undersigned was absent in a distant part of the dominion as shown by the letter of Colonel Pinnall, the deputy minister of militia, dated in the memorandum on Colonel Hughes and on the occasion to which he makes reference to the minister of agriculture having stricken off and initiated the name of an officer contained in a list which had been approved of by him, his remarks must have misled his hearers because they did not disclose the fact that Mr. Fisher was then acting minister of militia.

"It appears from Lord Dundonald's memorandum that the general officer commanding instead of appealing to the undersigned, or to Mr. Fisher, for such information as he may have desired, proceeded to Montreal on the 3rd instant as appears by the following extract from his memorandum: "When in Montreal on the 3rd of June, full details of the interference of the minister of agriculture were communicated to me in conversation as well as by letter from Colonel Smart, which was received on the morning of June 6th, the day on which I spoke at the officers' banquet." It is worthy of notice that the letter regarding the names requested by you last evening."

"The undersigned considers the conduct of the general officer commanding in failing to seek the information desired from the constitutional officers of the detachment of Montreal on the 3rd instant as he serves and taking the improper alternative in seeking from or through his subordinates to be highly reprehensible and without legitimate excuse.

Practice in Matter of Appointments. "The undersigned desires to point out, with reference to the practice with regard to appointments, that in making recommendations the general officer commanding has no official value or effect. It is the duty of the general officer commanding to recommend, but it is the duty of the minister or the governor in respect of the qualifications of the senior officers, and the qualifications of the junior officers, appointed to the regiment which has been under discussion, the following list will show that with the exception of Major J. Moffatt, commander of "C" squadron, and Major J. Holland, commander of "D" squadron, all were technically certified as cavalry officers.

"On the absence of congratulations from the house and then it will be seen that it was nothing of the kind.

Lord Dundonald, when I received my decoration, I refrain from speaking," said Colonel Pinnall, "but it may be necessary for me to do so if this kind of warfare is persisted. But, I may add, that some time after Lord Dundonald and I met and had a complete explanation, and since everything has been going on harmoniously and we have been on excellent terms."
