THE PRICE PRICES FOR THE WEEK

Despite the fact that the weather conditions have been so disagreeable, business has been very brisk in both the country and provision markets during the last week in this country market everything is plentiful. In the provision market the only notable changes are in the prices of canned goods, the new winter prices prevailing. All kinds of canned goods, with the exception of fish, oysters and corned beef, have advanced materially. Sugar has dropped and cornmeal has also declined. In the other markets prices remain about the same. The following are the principal quotations for the week:

FIGURES THAT TELL STORIES

EXPORTS OF FOREST PRODUCTS, 1910. NEXT to agriculture, exports of the forest rank first in importance. In the last fiscal year, Canada exported wood, manufactured and unmanufactured, to the value of \$53,522,000, being an increase over the previous year of nearly \$9,000,000. Of this, the bulk is unmanufactured wood, which includes logs, lumber of various kinds, square timber and pulpwood, representing \$47,427,000 of the foregoing total. Plank and lumber, \$23,000,000; spruce and other deals, \$6,460,000, and pulpwood \$6,000,000; constitute the principal single items which form this total. All of the pulpwood, by the way, went to the United States. Manufactured wood furnishes \$6,094,000 of the total exports, and includes furniture, doors, sashes, and blinds, matches and match splints, and wood pulp, which last is the largest item in this category, representing \$5,204,000, and most of which, or \$4,000,000 worth, went to the United States. Outside of Great Britain and the United States, the Argentine Republic was our largest customer, taking over \$2,326,000 worth of plank and boards alone. We also sold to these, among other countries, Newfoundland, the British West Indies, France, Mexico, Australasia and South Africa.

THE SPEED LIMIT.

There seems to be some misunderstanding concerning the speed limit imposed by the act on motor vehicles. Within the limits of a town or city where a road or street is closely built upon the speed limit is one mile in eight minutes or seven and a half miles per hour. Where a road or street is not closely built upon the speed may be increased to one mile in five minutes or twelve miles per hour. On a country road the speed may be increased to one mile in four minutes or fifteen miles per hour. The proposition has been that eight miles per hour was the legal limit in a town or city but as a matter of fact that rate of speed is greater than the legal maximum.

TWO MONTREAL AUTOISTS GUILTY OF KILLING GIRL

Montreal, Oct. 9—J. A. Dionne and J. L. Kieffer were found guilty of killing Miss Smith, in the court of King's Bench here on Saturday, after seven minutes' deliberation of the jury. Miss Smith was run down and killed by an automobile driven by Dionne and Kieffer on the Victoria bridge across the St. Lawrence on the night of Sunday, April 24. Sentence will be passed later.

CHARGED WITH MOONSHING IN MAINE WOODS

U. S. Marshals Arrest Wm. R. Peters of Seboomook. Bangor, Me., Oct. 7—Deputy Marshall Ford A. Stevens, Augustus H. Sweet, a special revenue agent, and Geo. F. Turner, deputy collector of internal revenue, all of Portland, arrived in Bangor Friday night, the marshal having as prisoner, William R. Peters, of Seboomook, who is charged with having operated a liquor distillery at that place. The party of officers who left Portland Tuesday morning had a hard journey to and from the alleged moonshiners retreat, traveling many miles through the woods on foot, the roads having been rendered impassable for vehicles by the great glare of last Saturday, which felled thousands of trees directly across the travelled way. Peters was arrested at his camp, which is twenty-one miles north of Seboomook, and George L. Wooster, also of Seboomook, was brought along as a witness. Peters denies that he ever manufactured any liquor and professes entire ignorance of distilling methods. For some months past, however, the federal authorities have been aware that some one in the vicinity of Seboomook has been manufacturing whiskey from oats, raisins, prunes and coarse sugar, and investigate-tions led to the arrest of Peters, who will be arraigned before Commissioner Hamlin in Bangor on Saturday.

Yarmouth, N. S., Oct. 8—Thos. H. Winslow, a clerk in Craig's drug store, was found dead in bed this morning. He left the store last evening at 10 o'clock and was in apparent good health. His wife, who is a daughter of E. Arts, of Bridgewater, has been away and returned this morning from Boston; Coroner Perron decided that an inquest was not necessary. Winslow was born in Boston and for a time was employed in a drug store in Bridgewater. He came to Yarmouth about 2 years ago, and entered the employ of A. Craig. He was about 40 years old.

SALISBURY BURGLARS STILL AT LARGE

Moncton, Oct. 9—Chief Rideout today went out to Salisbury Road in search of information concerning the suspicious movements of three men seen about eight miles out, since the Salisbury burglary. He learned that the three men had been beating their way along between Salisbury and Moncton since Thursday morning, getting meals at three different houses. The stories they told were of very suspicious nature. At one place they alleged they were from Maine en route to Sydney for work, and at another place they said they had run away from a vessel in St. John. One of the parties was tall and the others shorter and stouter and their description corresponded with the parties seen on the road to Salisbury the Wednesday previous to the burglary. Saturday about 2 o'clock two of the parties got dinner at Wm. Milner's, a mile and a half out of Moncton, this being the last trace of them. The chief found where the party spent Friday night in a shack two miles and a half from town. The police are keeping a sharp lookout and it is suspected that these are the parties who may have been concerned in the burglary as at the places they got meals they discussed the robbery and expressed the opinion it was the work of experts.
