At the public session of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference of the Methodist church last evening in Centenary church, Rev. He had entered the ministry of the church with high aspirations and hopes and he was convinced that the church was higher or more honorable calling to which a man could dedicate his powers. He had no sympathy with those who were ever complaining of the hardness of their lot. The spirit which should animate them was that of their Master who "for the joy that was set before him endured the cross despising the shame."

In all ages, the professor, even God had revealed Himself to men. Buddhism and Confucianism were but dim reflections of God but the full vision did not come till God had sent His only-begotten Son into the world who was the very image of His person. The process, he said, might be illustrated by supposing that a great artist had finished a picture and invited his friends to a private view.
