## GENTLEMEN,

In offering you my Thanks for the Confidence you have this day reposed in me, it is not easy for me to find words adequate to the expression of the sentiments I cannot but feel on the occasion; to obtain the highest Elective Office in the Country mush, at all times, be gratifying to its Possesson; to have obtained it by your unanimous choice, affords me a gratification more easily understood than described: It shall be my unceasing endeavour to deserve the confidence to liberally bestowed, by honestly, and to the best of my abilities, performing the duties that belong to the important office in which you have placed me. I will only add, that I will, upon all occasions, use my utmost exertions to preferve the Privileges of the House, by guarding the Rights that exclusively belong to it : holding it to be equally my duty, at all times, to guard the House against any act that may encroach upon the Prerogatives of the Crown, or interfere with the Rights of the other Branches of the Legislature.

A Meffage was delivered from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by Mr. Secretary George, commanding the attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker Elect, with the Houfe, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber, where Mr. Speaker Elect was prefented to His Excellency, by Mr. Poole, Member for the Town of Yarmouth, who addreffed His Excellency, as follows:

## May it please Your Excellency,

The Houfe of Affembly, agreeably to your Excellency's Commands, have proceeded to the choice of a Speaker, and have unanimously elected SIMON B. ROBIE, Efq. His Majefty's Solicitor-General, to that Office, and, by their direction, I beg leave to prefeat him for your Excellency's approbation.

After which, His Excellency was pleafed to fay :-

I approve of the Speaker, which the Houfe of Affembly have chosen.

The House being returned, and Mr. Speaker having taken the Chair,

Mr. Speaker reported, that the Houfe had been in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency had been pleafed to approve of the choice the Houfe had made of him to be their Speaker, and that he had fpoken to the following effect :--

## May it please your Excellency,

Your Excellency having been pleafed to approve of the choice of a Speaker, made by the Houfe of Affembly, I may hope, with confidence, that the fame favorable conftruction will be extended by your Excellency to their future proceedings: knowing, from the experience of the paft, how much it is the wifh of the Affembly that the refult of their deliberations for the public good fhould obtain the approbation of the Reprefentative of their Sovereign.

It is my duty, on the part of the Reprefentatives of His Majefty's loyal Subjects in Nova-Scotia, and in their Name, humbly to demand the enjoyment of all their accuflomed Rights and Privileges : that they may have freedom of speech in their debates ; that they, and their Servants, may be free from arrefts ; and that, whenever His Majefty's Service and the Interefts of the Province require it, I may have free access to your Excellency's Person.

Mr. Speaker also reported, that His Excellency, in reply, faid :

Mr. SPEAKER,

I most cheerfully grant your request, conformably to Accient Usage, the Law of the Land, and the Royal Instructions.

After which, Mr. Speaker faid, His Excellency was pleafed to make a Speech. of which, Mr. Speaker faid, he had, to prevent miftakes, obtained a Copy, which he read to the Houfe, and is as ollows:

## Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

IS Majesty having been most graciously pleased to confide to me the Civil Government of this Province, I have great satisfaction in meeting you in General Assembly.

In my Administration of the Government, I shall humbly endeavour to follow the wife and impartial course pursued by my noble and distinguished Predeceffor: exercising the powers vessed in me in a constitutional manner, and promoting, to the best of my ability, every measure conducive to the general prosperity of the Province, and to the comfort and happiness of all-classes of its People.
