Unquestionably the speech of Senator Root will go far to complete the change of sentiment. What nation could listen unmoved to a plea at once so impassioned and so clear. We are confident that the conscience of America will give answer in no uncertain fashion.

Both the World and the Tribune gives voice to sentiments along the same lines as the above, and great praise is given Senator Root for his manly utterances.

WANT GRANT INCREASED

(Courier Leased Wire)

TORONTO, Jan. 22.—A second large deputation of women interviewed the Ontario Government to-day and were received by Hon. James Duff. They asked an increased grant for the Toronto Women Hospital, an institution which has taken care of 195 girls and women from England during the past few months. Their present government grant is \$1400 a year, and they asked to have it doubled. Mr. Duff suggested that if the grant were increased the Government must be represented on the board, which idea the ladies welcomed.
