Honors for a Wolfville Young Lady.

At the closing exercises of Acadia Seminary, last week, Principal DeWolfe made an interesting announcement regarding Miss Evelyn Starr, who has been studying music in Germany since graduating from this school two years ago.

Miss Starr has had the honor of being selected by a jury of musical critics to represent Canada, and take an important part in the great "Festival of Empire," that was to have taken place this month in the "Crystal Palace," London, under the patronage of the late lamented King Edward VII. and Queen Alexandra. Owing to the King's sudden death, however, the "Festival" has been postponed for one year when it is expected that Miss Starr will be required to take the part already assigned her, when, no doubt, she will win further honors for her Alma Mater, and maintain her enviable reputation as a violinist.

Andrew's Church.

During the past two weeks St. Andrew's church has been undergoing a thorough renovation. Mr. J. Elliot Smith has been the committee in charge of the work, and he has spared no pains in making it a satisfactory one. The interior of the auditorium has been thoroughly cleaned, the woodwork newly varnished, the floor repainted and aisles carpeted in blue and red to match the other furnishings. The halls and vestibules have been attractively painted, the floors covered with linoleum of a neat design. This week the school room is receiving attention and it is expected the work will be completed by Saturday. The effect will be a decided improvement both in appearance and comfort.

Last Sunday large congregations assembled to welcome a former pastor, Rev. F. M. Macdonald, of Toronto, who is attending the meeting of the General Assembly at Halifax. Many old friends from outside the congregation were present to welcome him. Before beginning the morning sermon he referred briefly to the pleasure he felt in being again in his old pulpit. Fourteen years ago on Monday he was ordained and inducted into this, his first pastorate. He fondly referred to those to whom, in the old days, he had looked for counsel and whose places were now vacant.

His sermons, both morning and evening, were practical and helpful and were much enjoyed by the congregations.

Snow Out West.

The other day the thermometer dropped to seven degrees below the freezing point in the Canadian prairie country, and this has been followed by a snow and sleet storm over Alberta, sufficient to shut down the telegraph lines, seriously hamper train operations and cause the death of many cattle in the ranch country. This is an unseasonable weather and may have a serious effect upon the growing crops. The snow, of itself, will do little harm to growing crops, as our farmers here know very well, but the frost is likely to do serious damage.

The lure of the West has been for a good while very strong upon the people of the Eastern Provinces, says the Charlotetown Guardian, and many have been tempted to sell all that they possessed and hasten to the prairie country. It is worth while for those who contemplate a similar course to pause for a moment and contrast our delightful spring weather, our rapidly growing crops and other favorable conditions with what is now occurring in the Northwest. True the contrasts may not always be so favorable to the Island Province as they are at the present moment, but we have vastly less to fear from summer and fall frosts, and from desolating hail storms, cyclones and prairie fires than has the Northwest farmer. And we have good water here, fairly abundant fuel, easy access to churches, schools and post offices, not all of which are within the reach of the prairie settler, especially in the newer sections. All of which may be worth thinking over.

Apples as Cure for Intemperance.

The forbidden fruit of the Garden of Eden which brought sin into the world is now looked on as the means of driving sin out of the world. No less an august body than the Iowa State Horticultural Society is standing sponsor for the movement to remove the stigma from the apple.

When Eve, sorely tempted, partook of the luscious fruit which she had been forbidden to touch, she unwittingly cast a blight on the apple which centuries of cultivation and two national shows at Spokane have been unable to remove. It has remained for an apple loving country doctor to discover that not only can the world be fed until it has secured the necessary calories of energy, but that the craving for liquor—concededly to be the greatest cause of misery and crime—can be eradicated from the human body by the apple. As if this were not miracle enough, it is contended that General Grant might have won the siege of Vicksburg and the battle of Appomattox by munching on a Ben Davis, a Spitzenberg or a Jonathan, just as well as by puffing on a fat black cigar.

The use of apples as an article of diet will very much diminish, decrease and ultimately abate the appetite for alcoholic stimulants, declares Dr. Samuel Bailey, of Mount Airy, Iowa. "That this is a fact could be proved in many instances if a little care, caution and vigilance were taken to thoroughly investigate conditions. As a rule the habitual user of alcoholic stimulants is rarely a lover or consumer of apples. There seems to be a peculiar combination in apples, in the acid of them, or in the peculiar chemical combinations of the apple that allays the irritation, or so-called appetite, produced by the use of liquor. I am also of the opinion that the keen appetite for tobacco is limited by the use of apples. I am thoroughly convinced that any man who is a lover of whiskey and is in a condition when he thinks he must have a drink, if he will eat an apple before he takes the drink, will find that his appetite for the drink has been materially lessened, if not entirely abated for the time."

The Advantages of Outdoor Sleeping.

A good many people are discovering that it pays to sleep out of doors and the pity of it is that so many have waited until they have no lungs to speak of before making the discovery. But now is the time, almost hundred and ten, there is what I came near calling a wave of interest in outdoor sleeping, but perhaps it may be only a wavelet. In certain communities this wavelet has rolled up into a sort of fad, and it is spreading out and rolling higher mountains by month, so that in the course of time it will doubtless become a strong, husky breaker that shall sweep away our indoor maladies. For where outdoor sleeping has once become a habit it soon becomes a fixed habit. No one who has thoroughly enjoyed his bed in the open, night after night and summer and winter, ever willingly relinquishes it and is generally eager to get back to it. And here are some of the reasons:

The sweet feeling of naturalness and bodily well being.

Freedom from insomnia, for which outdoor sleeping is an absolute specific.

The wonderfully recuperative and vitalizing processes of which one quickly reaps the benefit, even though at first badly run down in physique.

The consciousness of escape from conditions that hamper if they do not actually threaten human life.

Immunity from colds and the diseases they engender.—June Busy Man's.

The Second Transcontinental.

Mr. Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern, hopes to have the Transcontinental line completed from Montreal to the Pacific in four years. In addition this company has a great many branches under the same control, and two railways and a coal mine in Nova Scotia. Mackenzie and Mann have also bought the whole of the Dunsmuir coal mine interests in British Columbia. They have land and mines in the northwest, and are now preparing a fleet of steamships. These two builders are easily beating the Grand Trunk Pacific enterprise. They own the whole common stock of their system. Yet when their Transcontinental system shall be completed the fixed charge will not be much more than half as much per mile as that of the Grand Trunk Pacific.—St. John Standard.

Boys' Camps.

Boys from all parts of the province are invited to attend either section of the Maritime Boys' Camp. Section one will be held August 3-17 at Robertson's Point, N. B. The boys gather at St. John and Fredericton and go into camp by one of the river boats. The tents are on a high point and look out over Grand Lake. In the distance can be seen the village of Chipman. Half a mile down the lake stands Sentinel Rock. It is an ideal place for a camp. Rev. G. A. Lawson is to be the Director of this camp and the Rev. H. T. DeWolfe, of the St. John Y. M. C. A., will assist him. Both of these men are old campers and they know how to make good fun in camp. Mr. Moore is an expert swimming teacher and will give instructions in all sorts of water sports.

Acadia University.

The teaching staff at Acadia, under the new president, Dr. Cutten, has been reorganized. Dr. J. P. Fitch has been appointed dean of the department of arts and science. Professor F. R. Haley has been appointed dean of the faculty of applied science, and Dr. A. C. Chute is dean of the newly reorganized theological department. The full theological faculty is as follows:—

(1) Rev. George B. Cutten, B. D., M. A., Ph. D., president of the university, professor of psychology of religion and pedagogy.

(2) Rev. A. C. Chute, M. A., D. D., dean and professor of Old Testament language and literature.

(3) Rev. H. T. DeWolfe, B. A., D. D., professor of New Testament language and literature.

(4) Rev. D. Webber, B. A., instructor in sacred oratory.

(5) Rev. James A. Francis, D. D., lecturer in homiletics.

The London Teachers' Association.

The London Teachers' Association makes it a rule that each year several thousand teachers shall be catered for in the holidays. Their principal excursion this year is a tour in Canada. The cost of this tour has been brought down to \$150, and as it will last a month it does not seem a dear one. The travellers will leave London on June 23, and they will be taken to all the chief towns in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. At Ottawa the party will be the guests of the City, and enjoy a good deal of hospitality. Other tours are mainly confined to the Old Country. In all, about 40,000 tourists are being arranged for during the summer.
