The speaker showed that the men posted to the school are broken in gently for the first two weeks of the course, which first two weeks of the course, which runs ten weeks, being given elmintary instruction and lectures on navigation with plenty of mathematics thrown in. At the end of th course the boys write an examination and they are allowed two failures which can be written as supplementals but if they have three failures they are immediately remustered on the station. "The ofremustered on the station. "The officers at the school have the final say as to training and classifica-tion of men," said the speaker. It was shown that the men put in 386 hours of training in nine weeks and that is a heavy schedule the

The training period was divided up by the speaker and showed that ery boy was given instruction in vigation, air gunnery, armament, and aircraft recognition. He praised the sports equipment at the school and also the instructors, who were with the boys throughout the course and showed they hav keenness for their pupils that m for good pilots and navigators, when the final test comes. He showed that the boys averaged 84.2 per cent in their courses which was a high standard. He told that Air Crew selection was made by him-self and other officers and each man was interviewed personally.
