"Now I do not believe that any citizen of this country can believe that Canada, during the post-war years, has any larger percentage of unemployment than any other country. It is quite true that we have had some unemployment not only during the past two or three years, but even at the present time, but, there would be a good deal less of unemploymnt in Canada today if the working men would take that which comes into their hands

COST OF LIVING

"The cost of living is a matter that I have had considerable to do with in maintaining supervision over conditions as they actually exist throughout Canada. The cost of living is 50 percent higher than it was in 1913 with the exception of rents, which show a general average increase of 43 percent. That condition, during the fall and winter months, will advance at least two or more points, dropping again in the spring of the year."

Mr. Murdock spoke on the enforcement of the Combines' Investigation Act which is now being utilized in checking up alleged dealings among officials of a certain fruit concern in British Columbia.

PLUNGES INTO SPEECH

Without wasting any time in pre-liminaries, owing to a storm which threatened, Premier King, after acknowledging the greetings of the crowd, plunged into his topic. At first he explained the change in the representation of Kent county at

Ottawa in which A. Bf McColg was made senator and the Honorable James Murdock represented the county. "A large number of names were brought forward when that vacancy occurred in the Senate, but today I have no reason to regret the action I took at that time.

SENATE HAS PLACE

"I noticed particularly one streamer over the road as I entered this beautiful park which read 'Self-Government is not Senate Government.' The Senate has its place in the constitution of the country. As the franchise of the country becomes wider and much of the government becomes more democratic, there is a special reason for keeping up the second chamber. The House of Commons, on two or three occasions, has had occasion to reiterate itself as representatives of the people, on important matters. Sometimes the Senate has interfered but I say that the Senate should not be a chamber to defeat the will of the people.
