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would have stated that during the electoral campaign of 1930 he was acting as trustee for the funds of the Liberal Party and in that quality only had received from Mr. Sweeney, of his own motion, the sum which Sweeney subsequently mentioned in his statement to the Commons Committee; that in due course he turned all of this money over to the treasurer of this party; that he subsequently received a telegram from the Committee asking his presence in Ottawa; that he was informed by Mr. MacKensie, who said he had conferred with the Chairman, Mr. Gordon, that Senator Raymond would not further be required; that he again informed Mr. MacKensie that he would be subject to the call of the Committee at any time and could be in Ottawa at three hours' notice. (Pages A33-34-35)

It is not deemed necessary here to set out the early history of Senator Raymond's connection with the Beauharnois project, as that is very clearly done at Roman numeral page B26 hereinbefore referred to.

Senator Raymond was examined by Mr. Smith, pages A131-140 inclusive, and recalled at page A149.

There is no doubt that Senator Raymond knew that the grant to the Beauharnois Company from the Province of Quebec was valueless without the approval of the Dominion Government. (A132)
