His pall was borne by six of his fellow Councillors, and the train of mourners, embracing ten of the ministers of the city, the members of the bar, the directors of the Bank, the Board of Trade, and many eminent merchants, illustrated the fact, that public worth and private virtues, even where those characteristics have ceased to exist, can be appreciated by a discerning community.

Speech of the Hon. Philip Hone, at the Dinner of the
