## WHAT KENT MISSED

J. B. Jackson, of Ingersoll, has been appointed commercial agent at Leeds, England, for the Dominion Government. He has some experience as a commercial agent. He could tell you how much money it cost to buy the South Oxford nominations for Sir Richard Cartwright when S. H. Jones, of Toronto, was after it. He could tell you how much money was sent up for that purpose. He acted as commercial agent then and ought to know. Not all of it was spent, for, as we have just observed, Mr. Jackson was a commercial agent. He acted in that capacity in the South Oxford election trial. He got money in Toronto to buy up evidence whether true or false, to unsettle Sutherland. He paid a man named Chambers \$375 for eight charges and promised him \$375 more if six of the eight were proven. Not all the money he got in Toronto was spent for this purpose, for Jackson is a commercial agent. If he had succeeded he would have been made a judge in Kent or some other unfortunate county, but his failure saved the good people of that or some other county from the infliction. Instead of that, he got a job for which he is more fitted but at the same time it is not the job he deserves. Can any one tell why the Dominion Government is obliged to reward the men who do dirty work for the provincial government? Preston after the West Egin carnival got a valuable position from the Dominion Government, and now Jackson is similarly rewarded. Does Laurier still regard the Ontario Government as his "right hand?" If so, he had better submit to amputation, for the cancerous growth cannot be arrested by salves.—Hamilton Spectator.

## THE CHAMPION LIAR

The Great American Liar has been definitely located. He resides at 3501 Columbia avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota. His name is Robert Christianson, and he is a lawyer. He was—or says he was—in Toronto when the news in the decision in the Alaska boundary dispute was received, and he tells this story about it:

"It was really amusing, and reminded me very forcibly of the old days of the Bryan and free silver street discussions. I found, though, that the real thinking and sensible Canadians don't pay any attention to it, but certain politicians and their followers were wild, and mounted boxes in the streets and gathered crowds about them. While they cursed the United States and talked of war."

"There are a great many Americans there, of course, and the time, on business matters, and the first day someone mounted the steps of a public building and harangued the crowd and grew excited. The crowd cheered and shook their fists. He wanted to fight America right off."

"We licked them once," he cried, "and we can lick them again."

"There were a few Americans standing on the border of the crowd laughing at the trouble, and one of them called out that they couldn't whip one state. I expected to see trouble, but the Americans just gazed at the crowd and stood there while the crowd shook their fists and howled and raised a fuss to beat the band."

"There was trouble there for several days and there were pilgrimages of crowds looking for American flags to insult, but they didn't happen to find any. It all grows out of the political following, for when a Canadian gets a little public office he thinks he is the czar, and naturally politicians are afraid of a growing sentiment in favor of America and they want to foster hard feeling as much as possible. But what struck me was the uniform good nature with which Americans took the insults, just as if their little brothers were angry and talking nonsense and they were hearing with them."

"But I wouldn't be surprised if the politicians succeeded in getting up a pretty big sentiment against the United States."

It is not necessary to tell Canadians that there is not a word of truth in the entire story; but, all the same, Mr. Christianson's romance will be accepted for truth in the United States.

## GIBSON GET A GAIT ON.

## Township Councils.

## HOWARD COUNCIL.

The municipal council of the township of Howard met at Township hall, Saturday, Nov. 5th, 1903, as per adjournment. All members present.

Minutes of last regular and special meetings and court of revision on the Stover and Campbell drains were read and confirmed.

Communications.  
From the Michigan Central R. R. Co., in reference to their assessment on the McKay drain, stating that they were not aware of said drain being under construction.

From the Municipality of Harwich, appealing against their assessment on the Alexander drain, claiming too high assessment on roads and too large amount required for culvert.

From John Trudgen, in reference to culvert opposite his lot, stating that same is too small to carry the water brought down, causing damage to his farm. As said is an award drain council recommended him to notify all parties interested to have their portions completed as per statute.

From Mrs. Almiran Handy, Morpeth, stating that she had felt into a hole on the street and had injured herself so that she was unable to do any work since that time, being now over six weeks, and claimed damage for same \$150. A. J. Stevenson, M.D., and J. E. Charlesworth, M.D., certified as to her injury, stating she is still suffering from the fall.—No action.

From Jonas Gosnell, county clerk, wishing to have their claims for interest on arrears of taxes sent in as soon as possible.

From David Martin, in reference to excavation made for the proposed arch over Duffin creek, stating same is not properly filled, wishing to have it done as soon as possible.

From R. J. Duffin, notifying the council that he held a registered privilege for the construction of a dam across Duffin creek where the proposed arch is to be erected, and any damage arising therefrom will hold the council responsible.

From S. B. Wilson, stating that he intended to appeal to the court to have the by-law for the improving of the Whitman drain quashed. That the assessments for benefit is too high and that the drain is not put in its proper place and that he did not use it as an outlet.

From Geo. M. Baird, clerk Harwich, stating that their council had adopted the report on the McKay drain, but they consider the report on the Alexander drain excessive.

Reports.  
From James A. Bell, C. E., for the repairing and improving of the Waterworth drain, stating that same required improving at a cost of \$361.

From David Wilson, commissioner No. 4 E. H. f., stating that he had employed John Cain, township engineer, to take measurements for the amount of earth required for the grading over the arch at Morpeth, reported that it would take 1,688 yards to make a proper grade. His fees for same \$5.

From Geo. McDonald, clerk, stating that the revise, assessor and clerk met Oct. 10th for the selection of jurors as per statute, entitling the revise and assessor to \$4 each for their services.

A number of accounts were ordered to be paid.

The following persons addressed the council:—

Mrs. Parker, asking permission to put a wire fence on trees opposite her lot, which would take in about two feet of roadway.

James R. McGregor, Jas. Scane, A. McKinlay and W. Waterworth were heard in reference to report on Waterworth drain.

John Trudgen re culvert opposite his lot.

T. Fritz, James Thomson and D. Leitch in reference to this year's assessment on Anderson drain, as in their opinion they were not indebted to the corporation.

Resolutions.  
Moved by Wilson and Brien, that the grievances of D. Martin be left to the commissioner, H. McLarty, to settle by repairing where excavation was made if he deems it necessary.—Carried.

Moved by McLarty and Wilson, that the report of J. A. Bell, C. E., on the Waterworth drain be received and clerk prepare by-law for same.—Carried.

Moved by Brien and Williams, that whereas the M. C. R. has been notified to open up the sewer pipe on Scane sidewalk and ditch between lots 7 and 8, also on Howard Road, and failing to attend to it the clerk further notify the proper authorities that unless attended to within ten days the township engineer will be sent on to have it put in proper shape.—Carried.

Moved by Brien and Wilson, that the clerk notify the council of Ridgetown that the rubbish taken out of Harrison drain and placed on Erie St. north Howard township, be removed at once, as it is much complained of as likely to cause damage, and they will be held responsible for any damage caused thereby.—Carried.

Moved by McLarty and Brien, that the report of D. Wilson regarding Talbot St. arch, also of George McDonald re selecting jurors, be received and parties paid as per report.—Carried.

Council met as court of revision on McGregor's Creek, Buller, Harrison, Campbell and McKay drains.

On motion of Wilson and Brien, the court of revision on McGregor Creek and Buller drains was adjourned till Dec. 15.

A number of alterations were made in the Campbell drain assessment, after which council resumed for general business.

Moved by McLarty and Wilson, that the by-law on the Waterworth drain be provisionally adopted, and the court of revision be held Dec. 3rd at 10 a. m. at the township hall.—Carried.

By-laws for the repairing and improving of the Whitman and the West Branch of the McDowell drains were read the third time and finally passed.

Moved by Wilson and McLarty, that this council adjourn.
