REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL.

23rd February, 1850.

The Committee of Council are respectfully of opinion that without in the alightest degree intringing on the sovereignty over the waters of the St. Lawrence, Your Excellency might authorize the Collector of Quebec to grant licences to Foreign vessels to proceed to Montreal either with or without cargo, and tikewise authorize the Collector of Montreal to grant licences to such Foreign vessels to return with cargo to Quebec, so as to clear from that port. Such an arrangement would, in the opinion of the Committee, afford the only relief which it is possible under existing elecumstances to extend to the trade of Montreal, but they have little doubt that it would effect the desired object without in any way compromising rights which the Committee of Council are of opinion ought at all times to be most carefully guarded.
