## RESOLUTION FOR AN ENQUIRY IS TURNED DOWN

### Conservative Party Satisfied With the Royal Commission.

### BRODER SPOKE AGAINST PARTY

### Four Conservatives Voted For the Laurier Resolution.

Ottawa, April 5.—Following the Government's announcement of a thorough investigation of the Kite charges by a Royal Commission, the Laurier resolution calling for a general investigation of the work of the Shell Committee by a Parliamentary committee, was rejected in the House last night on a vote of 82 to 44, a majority of 38.

Four members on the Conservative side of the House voted with the Opposition: Mr. W. F. Maclean, of St. John's; Hon. Andrew Broder, of Dundas; Mr. A. A. Mondou, of Yarmouche, and Paul E. Lamarche, of Nicolet.

Mr. Broder had previously made a brief statement in which he denied having given an interview regarding his intentions. He added that he was glad to see the Government going as far as it could, but said that he wished to go further, and would support the Laurier resolution. Mr. Broder is a fellow-townsmen of Colonel J. W. Allison.

Neither Mr. Maclean, Mr. Mondou nor Mr. Lamarche explained in the House the reason for his vote.

The final stage of the debate brought no new developments, so far as the Opposition was concerned, despite the diligent circulation of rumors that more "bombs" were to be dropped. Two Liberal members took part in the discussion yesterday, Mr. E. M. MacDonald, of Pictou, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the latter exercising his right as mover of the resolution to deliver a second speech, in which he persisted in his demand for an enquiry by a Parliamentary Committee in preference to the testing of the Kite charges by a judicial commission.

Earlier in the afternoon the Liberal leader had taken occasion to disseminate a report, widely disseminated by his own press, to the effect that he had been called in conference by the Duke of Connaught "to the course of a certain investigation." The report, said Sir Wilfrid, was without foundation.

## MEXICO TAKING STEPS TO REPAIR ITS FINANCES

### Commission Appointed to Redeem Money in Circulation.

Mexico City, April 5.—Mexico's plan for financial redemption was made public last night in two decrees issued by General Carranza, the first of which orders cessation of further issues of paper money, and the second which provides for a monetary commission of five members who shall have full power in the matter of the redemption of the present circulating medium.

The new commission will be headed by Luis Cabrera, minister of finance, and will begin its work in Mexico City, May 1.

The decree regarding the stoppage of the printing of paper money is directed to the Treasury department, and says:

"By order of the First Chief you are directed to immediately suspend all further emission of actual paper money now in circulation, concentrating your efforts toward issuing new bills of one or two pesos denomination which will form part of the new uncounterfeitable issue provided for by the decree of July 1, 1915."

The issue referred to in the decree calls for 250,000,000 pesos of one, two, five, ten, twenty, fifty and one hundred dollar bills, which are to be engraved in New York. It will eventually substitute the present issues of 500,000,000 pesos, which according to the treasury department officials, has been greatly increased by wholesale counterfeiting.

## RAILWAYS NEEDED TO FINISH FIGHT

### American Expedition Suffers From Lack of Transportation.

### FOLLOWING VILLA INTO MEXICO

### Unofficial News That Clash Have Occurred Already.

Washington, April 5.—Latest developments in the Mexican situation point to the use of Mexican railways. The success of the American expedition now largely depends upon the immediate completion of arrangements for the use of Mexican railways. Officials anxiously awaited a reply to renewed representations sent to General Carranza, through special agent Rodgers, at Queretaro, that the de facto government immediately fulfill its promise to permit the commercial shipment of supplies to General Pershing's forces by giving specific orders to General Gaviro at Juarez and other Mexican commanderies.

In the chase for Francisco Villa is extending further and further into Mexico, as evidenced by news of the second clash between the United States cavalry and a band of outlaws near Guerrero coupled with reports that the bandit chieftain himself has left his command broken into small groups to occupy the American pursuers while he flees southward for arrangements for the use of the railroads should be concluded at once.

Although lacking official confirmation in all its details, the report that a squadron of the tenth cavalry, the crack negro troops, had encountered a band of Villa bandits near Agua Caliente, near Guerrero and had killed Carranza, was read with satisfaction in official circles to-day. There much interest also in border advice to the effect that General Canuto Reyes, the Villa commander at Torreon, toward whom Villa is believed to be fleeing, had offered to surrender to General Trevino, commander of the Carranza forces, if given amnesty.

## An Interoceanic Story

## First Lord of the Sea

All the Surprises of the Land Fighting, No Pessimism of the British Navy

By Special Wire to the Courier.

New York, April 6.—The London correspondent of The Tribune cables under yesterday's date:

Arthur J. Balfour is "first lord of the admiralty," head of the British navy—the greatest navy in the world. With it out of the way, Germany could win the war in a couple of months, take over the British Isles, hammer France into submission, and demand ruinous indemnities that would turn the world topsy-turvy.

It is Mr. Balfour's job to see that the navy remains very much in the way. Recently I had the pleasure of seeing and talking with him at his London home, only a stone's throw from the office of the admiralty. Fully six feet tall and broad in proportion, and kind without a trace of the brusqueness commonly associated with sea lords.

I should say that war is the last game Mr. Balfour would select for enjoyment or recreation. He is the antithesis of Von Trepitz.

Turning the conversation to the question of "revenge" "revenge" "revenge" "What has been the big surprise of this war? Submarines, aerial warfare, speed or gun range?"

"None of these," replied Mr. Balfour. "In my opinion trench warfare and the value of artillery. Students of the submarine have not been surprised; they had thought out and planned ways of increasing its efficiency and also defenses against it. Students of air problems have not been surprised at the development of aerial warfare. The development of both these branches of fighting has been rapid, but along lines thought out before the war.

"No one anticipated that trench warfare would play so great a part in modern fighting and no one fore-casted the tremendous importance of artillery. Even the Germans, with all their thoroughness in making preparations to this conflict, failed to foresee to what extent trench fighting would have to be relied upon, once the contending forces were of any near equal strength.

"The Germans prepared for artillery fighting, but Verdun is a striking
