SOLICITOR-GEN. OF BRITAIN IS VERY ABLE MAN

Sir George Cave Has Been in Parliament for Ten Years.
SALARY OF OFFICE \$75,000 PER ANNUM
Even at That He Makes Financial Sacrifice in Holding Office.

It was once said by Sir John Simon, at the time he was Solicitor-General, that the occupant of that post was really an "office boy of the Government." If that be so, the present government have an "office boy" of very notable distinction and remarkable ability, as well as of somewhat mature years. For the Rt. Hon. Sir George Cave, Unionist M. P. for the Kingston division of Surrey, is one of the strongest and sanest members of the House of Commons, and one of the very soundest lawyers at the English bar.

He is just sixty years old—sixteen years older than his senior fellow-officer of the Crown, Sir F. E. Smith—and has been in parliament for ten years only. From the moment he entered the house he made his mark, thus constituting himself a tangible refutation of the generally-held doctrine that neither a middle-aged man nor a man who enters the House with a great reputation gained outside has much chance of becoming a first-rate House of Commons success.

Sir George Cave, however, was happy in his opportunities. When he came to Parliament, the Unionist party was at very low ebb, and a man of really great debating gifts, such as he possesses, was bound to come to the fore. Moreover, the subjects of discussion were such as he was pre-eminently well versed in. He had not been long in the House before the Campbell-Bannerman Government brought in its licensing bill—and what George Cave does not know on the subject of licensing is not worth knowing. He regularly riddled the bill, and the hands of the peers, at that time with their veto unimpaired. Subsequently his speeches in criticism of the famous Lloyd George Budget made a deep impression in the House. To-day Sir George Cave is a distinct power in Parliament—a greater power than his official position of Solicitor-General would seem to indicate.

As Solicitor-General Sir George Cave draws a salary of \$30,000 a year, but he probably makes a financial sacrifice when he accepted office—even an office carrying with it remuneration so generous a scale. For he was doing literally an enormous business at the Chancery Bar, and since 1913, had what is called a "special," which term has a world of significance about it as regards the magnitude of the fees which the lucky "special" receives. In fact, he swept all before him at the bar just as he had done at Oxford, and he is recognized as perhaps the most erudite and profound lawyer in the present House of Commons.

A MONUMENT TO FIRST MAN KILLED

Jules Andre Peugeot Was Killed by a German Aug. 2, 1914.

Paris, May 29.—A national subscription has been started to raise funds for the erection at Jonchery in the department of Haut Rhin of a monument to Jules Andre Peugeot, the corporal in the 44th regiment of infantry, who was the first French victim of the war. He was killed by a German at 10 a.m., August 2, 1914, the day before the declaration of war.

Corporal Peugeot was a sentry on the road to Faverois, when an advancing German patrol was sighted. He was amazed to see troops twelve miles inside French territory and went out to arrest the German officer. He was twice wounded, but before he was killed, shot and fatally wounded, the lieutenant in command of the German patrol, Corporal Peugeot was a school teacher by profession, but was incorporated into the army on November 16, 1913, and was made a corporal on April 1, 1914. He had passed examinations to become an officer in the reserves.
