SENOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Deminion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for + the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but set Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and caltivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within alumiles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.06 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of bree years after earning homestead pat-nt; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-mption patent may be obtained as soon emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months is each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

Troops Occupy Miobo and Katibus, Advancing Towards Other Posts-Natives Willingly Accept Portuguese Control

Lisbon, via Paris, Sept. 23-An extensive invasion of German East Africa by Portuguese troops is reported in an official statement issued by the War Office. The statement says:

"After the passage of the Rovuma River our columns advanced eight miles and occupied Miobo. The left column seized Katibus and the German barracks, and then proceeded toward Macoas. The columns on the centre and right, marching toward the Migomba depot, reached Taketo on Rovuma Bay. The enemy retreated in the direction of Saswara west of Lindi. The natives willingly accepted Portuguese domination."

Germany declared war on Portugal on March 9, and a month later the Portuguese military commander in Africa reported that he had occupied Kionga, a port on the border of German and Portuguese East Africa. Since then there have been no reports of any activity by the Portuguese. The greater part of the German colony is in the hands of the Belgians and South Africans, according to the official
