FLU STABILIZED AT SIMCOE TO-DAY

Many Cases Still Serious, But No Deaths Occurred Yesterday

PLENTY OF NURSES

Simcoe, Oct. 25.—(From Our Own Correspondent).—There were no patients admitted and none discharged from the hospital yesterday. It is thought that three may leave to-day. Most of the twenty under treatment are progressing favorably. But outside there are still many severely afflicted and some quite severely so. Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Green are both down. Mr. Green was unable to attend on Wednesday here the funeral of a younger brother, who died of the disease in Hamilton. Mrs. A. N. West was better yesterday.

The West and Peachey plant is practically out of business temporarily and all other factories are feeling the shortage of help freely. Mrs. Sherk spent a rather bad day yesterday and early in the afternoon her recovery was despaired of, but at last reports late last night, the afflicted lady was still baffling the disease. The management reported last night that there is no shortage of help for the immediate future at the hospital.

Time for Action. A certain element in town has been endeavoring to prevent volunteer nurses from continuing at work at the hospital. "You are a big fool for going there," is their solution. It is not about time the Board of Health took cognizance of this element and had a few individuals of this type made examples of? BATTLEPLANE CAPTURED.

By Courier Leased Wire. With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, Thursday, Oct. 24.—(By the Associated Press).—American captured an immense German armored battleplane Wednesday north of Brieffles. The machine was virtually intact, but the pilot and gunner made their escape. Just when the machine landed is unknown. Infantry forces found the monster.

From east of the Meuse German artillery endeavored to protect the plane, but the American guns let down a counter-fire on the enemy gun emplacements. When a half come American troops hauled the plane to safety.

A number of valuable instruments and two machine guns were captured. The battleplane was equipped with a bomb-dropping device and had a gun and a signaling arrangement so fixed that the gunner could shoot directly beneath him. This gun was firing on roads. So far as known this is the first plane of this type captured by Americans. Half the fuselage was covered with quarter-inch armour.

HOSTAGES SHOT.

Amsterdam, Oct. 25.—From the time that Mose Urtzky, communist for elections to the Constituent Assembly of Russia, was assassinated late in August, up to October 1st, 65 hostages, including five priests, were shot by the Bolsheviks, according to Petrograd despatches quoting the newspaper Pravda.

ITALIAN OFFENSIVE.

By Courier Leased Wire. London, Oct. 25.—(1.15 p.m.)—Italians troops have begun an offensive between the Piave and the Brenta. In the Monte Grappa sector Thursday they advanced across the Orto River and captured Monte Salaric, part of Monte Prassolan and Monte Pertica.

In the Flavio River the Italians have captured the islands of Grave Pattadopol and Magiore. The weather on the front is unfavorable.

Fearing death from influenza, Miss Gertrude Mayo, Brooklynton, killed herself by cutting her throat.

Captain "Eddie" Grant, ex-third baseman of the New York Giants has been killed in action.

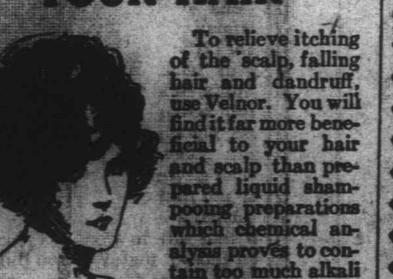
PRELIMINARY HEARING.
