Election Signs

Signs are multiplying that the country is on the eve of an election says an Ottawa dispatch:

The announcement that the government has decided to advance four million dollars to the farmers of Saskatchewan and Alberta to finance their seed requirements is one of the latest indications.

But there are others. The supplementary estimates, it is said, will bulk more largely than any previous work of Finance Minister Fielding, and the "interests" of the doubtful constituencies will be well looked after.

On the east, the government has made a bid for the support of the shipping industries by rescinding the privileges of the Norwegian steamers to ply their coastwise trade between Canadian ports.

In British Columbia, the big fight will be on the immigration question, and the government will claim support by reason of the arrangement made with Viscount Hayashi, Japanese foreign minister.

What help the premier expects to get in Manitoba will depend upon the boundaries bill which is to come later in the session. Will be province to oppose the claim of that province. Quebec will not be forgotten when the anti-election favors are passed around. There may be more warms where there is no water to float craft, bridges and docks and breakwaters, while Ontario will be promised post offices, harbor improvements and other public works.

Both sides expect an appeal soon after the session. Because of this the members are making preparations for a long seige.

BY-LAW No.

A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF REGINA TO PROVIDE FOR THE RAISING OF THE SUM OF \$300,000.00 TO BE EXPENDED IN THE EXTENSION OF THE SYSTEM OF SEWERAGE FOR THE CITY OF REGINA.

WHEREAS the Council of the City of Regina deemed it expedient that the existing system of sewerage recently constructed by the said City should be extended as a municipal public work under the powers contained in "The Regina Charter" and "The Municipal Public Works Act,"

AND WHEREAS it is expedient for the purpose of defraying the cost of the said extension of the system of sewerage that debentures should be issued to the amount of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) payable in thirty years from the 1st day of March, 1908, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum payable half yearly, which sum of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) is the debt intended to be created by this By-Law.

AND WHEREAS the amount of rateable property in the said City according to the last revised assessment roll (namely assessment roll of the year 1907) is eleven million one hundred and forty-seven thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars (\$11,147,571.00).

AND WHEREAS the total amount of the existing debenture debt of the said City is seven hundred and six thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and seventy-six cents (\$706,877.76) of which no part either principal or interest thereof is in arrears.

AND WHEREAS the said City is required by law to make provision for the sinking fund to cover the repayment of the said Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) part of the indebtedness of the said City.

AND WHEREAS the said Sinking Fund now amounts to Twenty-four thousand two hundred and sixty-one dollars and fourteen cents (\$24,261.14).

AND WHEREAS the Council of the City of Regina on 15th June 1907, passed a By-Law numbered 397 providing for the issue of Debentures to the amount of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) to pay for the extension of the system of sewerage and afterwards on the 6th January 1908, passed their By-Law numbered 423 by which they changed the manner of payment of the said principal sum of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) and repealed the said By-Law Number 397.

AND WHEREAS doubts have arisen as to the regularity of such By-Law No. 423 and it is deemed necessary that this By-Law should be passed.

THEREFORE the Council of the City of Regina in Council assembled enacts as follows:

1. That the said By-Laws Numbers 397 and 423 are hereby repealed.

2. It shall be lawful for the Council of the City of Regina to borrow on behalf of the said City upon the credit of the Municipality at large the sum of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of constructing the said extension of the system of sewerage as aforesaid by the issue of debentures of the said City on the credit of the said Municipality at large for the said sum of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) to be payable as hereinafter provided.

3. The said Debentures shall bear date on the day of the issue thereof and shall be made payable in such manner that the whole amount of the principal indebtedness incurred thereby shall be paid at the end of thirty years from the 1st day of March, 1908.

4. The rate of interest shall be five per centum per annum computed from 1st March, 1908, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September in each year and coupons shall be attached to each of the said debentures representing the respective payments of interest.

5. The said debentures shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal and shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and the said Coupons shall be deemed to be properly executed by each one having printed or lithographed thereon the name of the Mayor and by having placed thereon the written signature of the City Treasurer and the debentures and coupons shall be made payable at the Bank of Montreal in London, England; New York, Montreal, Toronto or Regina, and the debentures may be issued in sterling or currency or partly in the one and partly in the other.

6. In addition to all other amounts there shall be levied and collected in each year, during the currency of the said debentures, on all rateable property in the said City by special rate or rates sufficient to defray the sum of Three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for the annual interest and the sum of One thousand and sixty-nine dollars and eighty cents (\$1,069.80) by way of sinking fund to meet the principal at maturity, making in all the sum of Four thousand and sixty-nine dollars and eighty cents (\$4,069.80).

7. This By-Law shall take effect on the day of the final passing thereof.

8. J. Kelso Hunter is hereby appointed Returning Officer for the purpose of taking the votes of the burgoesses upon the said By-Law.

NOTICE
The above is a true copy of the proposed By-Law which has been introduced by the Council of the City of Regina and which may be finally passed by the said Council in the event of the assent of the burgoesses to the extension of the system of electric light and power that debentures should be issued to the amount of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) payable in thirty years from the 1st day of March, 1908, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum payable half yearly, which sum of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) is the debt intended to be created by this By-Law.

AND WHEREAS the amount of rateable property in the said City according to the last revised assessment roll (namely assessment roll of the year 1907) is eleven million one hundred and forty-seven thousand five hundred and seventy-one dollars (\$11,147,571.00).

AND WHEREAS the total amount of the existing debenture debt of the said City is seven hundred and six thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and seventy-six cents (\$706,877.76) of which no part either principal or interest thereof is in arrears.

AND WHEREAS the said City is required by law to make provision for the sinking fund to cover the repayment of the said Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) part of the indebtedness of the said City.

AND WHEREAS the said Sinking Fund now amounts to Twenty-four thousand two hundred and sixty-one dollars and fourteen cents (\$24,261.14).

AND WHEREAS the Council of the City of Regina on 15th June 1907, passed a By-Law numbered 397 providing for the issue of Debentures to the amount of Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000.00) to pay for the extension of the system of electric
