needed funds are provided is by a direct tax levied on holders of property and some others, which taxes are expended by officers appointed for the purpose, cocrding to statuary regulations. Throgghout the country, parts of the province the public roads are divided into distriets of two or more miles in cxtent, over each of which an officer is placed, called a Surveyor of Highways.
His duty it is to call upon each indiHis duty it is to eall upon each indivay labor, either himself to work a way labor, eether number of days or to pay his proportion of the woney requiry. But there is a modification of the law in thy case of certain villages and of the
totws gencrally. Thege are considered to be of ssfficient importagce to require more than one officer to perform the duty; for where the population is great and business extensive, there is the more need of care, as regards the
strets and roads. Conscquently two trets and roads, Conscquenty tw they are called, are appointed to the serrice. These commissioners constitufe a Board having a common fund, made up of the taxes 1 v.ved on the dis
trict. One of the number, as treasur er, disburses the monegs ander the di rection of the Board. This, at least is
the intention of the law, although it is said that in a certain Village, not hundred niles fiom Wolfville, it has not always been observed, It wil
