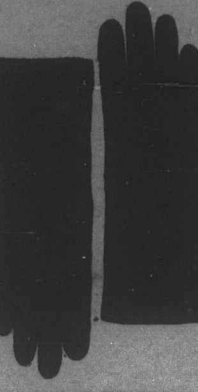

Baptism was administered to two candidates at the Baptist church last Sunday evening, by the pastor, Rev. H. B. Hatch.

The Acadia Dairy Co. is advertising for tenders for the conveyance of milk on the different routes to the factory during the coming year.

The Fak Jubilee Singers are to make a tour of the province during December and will likely visit Wolfville where they are always given a warm welcome.

The members of "Maple Leaf" Division, Greenwich, are to hold a picnic in their hall on Thursday evening, Nov. 23rd, at which a good time is promised. Doors will open at 7 o'clock and the admittance fee will be 5 cents.

The Newport Nursery Co. recently purchased the nursery of Henry Rand at Canning. This nursery contained 10,000 apple trees, 6,000 of which were large enough to plant this fall. The company, in addition to this number, shipped a carload to Canning from their other nurseries. These have all been delivered in Canning and vicinity the past ten days. This is probably the largest sale ever made in the same territory in Canada.
